1. How many Waste Transfer Stations are there within your area? (please list)

There are two transfer stations:

- Otaihanga Resource Recovery Facility, located at 220 Otaihanga Road, Otaihanga
- Ōtaki Resource Recovery Centre, located at 1 Riverbank Road, Ōtaki

• General Household Waste

The following materials for recycling purposes:

- E-waste
- Scrap Metal
- Tyres (car, truck and tractor)
- Gas Bottles

- Waste Oil
- Paint
- Wood (At the wood recycling centre run by Zero Waste Ōtaki)

• Small volumes of clean fill.

3. How far are they away from any residential zoned sections?

Otaihanga Transfer station was built in 2008 and is situated in a rural zoned area, with larger lifestyle blocks the closest properties. The property boundary of the nearest lifestyle property is 205m away.

In Ōtaki the transfer station was built in 1995 and is situated in the industrial zone in Ōtaki on Riverbank Road. The first residential houses are about 415m away.

4. Which was established first - Nearest Residential sections or Waste Station?

In Otaihanga the Transfer Station was built in 2008 with the nearest residential building constructed in the last 8 years. In Ōtaki the residential area was there already, the transfer station was constructed at the old landfill site which was opened in the 1950's and has always been in the industrial zone.
