UPDATE ON YOUTH ACTION PLAN

PURPOSE OF REPORT

1 This report provides an update on the 2011/12 activities under the *Yth2U Youth Action Plan: A Plan of Action for Kāpiti Coast Youth (Action Plan)* and includes the proposed work plan for the Kāpiti Coast Youth Council's activities for 2012/13.

SIGNIFICANCE OF DECISION

2 The Council's significance policy is not triggered.

BACKGROUND

Youth Action Plan

- In June 2011 the Council endorsed the Action Plan. The Action Plan seeks to improve the quality of life for young people living in the District. It also seeks benefits for Council and the District through increased youth participation in decision-making in core Council business.
- The Action Plan outlines the commitments the Council and the Youth Council have made on addressing the issues raised in the Kāpiti Coast Youth Survey 2010. The Action Plan contributes to Community Outcome Six and Seven of the Long Term Plan:

Outcome 6: 'The District is a place that works for young people'

Outcome 7: 'The District has a strong, healthy, safe and involved community.'

- 5 The Action Plan outlines five goals for the period 2011 2015.
 - Communities which are safe for and supportive of youth
 - A Council which values and listens to its youth
 - A District which has youth friendly spaces and places
 - A District where there is lots for young people to do
 - A District which supports strong positive youth development

Kāpiti Coast Youth Council

- The current Youth Council membership was finalised in May 2012. It has a youth membership which changes during the calendar year due to other commitments, young people leaving the District and other factors. The current Youth Council is comprised of members who have been involved in the implementation of the Action Plan over the past year and new members who were recruited in May 2012.
- 7 There are currently 21 Youth Council members. The group is between 14 and 20 years of age and includes young people:
 - attending the District's three colleges
 - attending Kura Kaupapa
 - in training and attending tertiary education institutions
 - seeking work.
- 8 The Council has continued to work in partnership with the new Youth Council to deliver the Action Plan activities in 2011/12. As a part of their orientation camp for new members, the Youth Council undertook an evaluation of Action Plan activities for 2011/12 and drafted a work programme with Council staff for 2012/13.

CONSIDERATIONS

- 9 The Action Plan details the Youth Council and Council's contribution to action areas across a range of Council activities including: social wellbeing, leisure and open spaces, community facilities, transport and democratic services. Actions relating to other groups within Council have been discussed with these groups.
- 10 The Action Plan was developed as a youth led project with the role of Council as an advisor to the process. The current Youth Council are committed to the overall goals and aims of the Action Plan and have drafted the 2012/13 work programme.
- 11 The Youth Council manages the content, advancement and structure of the Action Plan in partnership with the Council. Any suggested changes to the annual work programme by the Committee will need to go to the Youth Council for discussion and further action.

13 The work programme for Action Plan activities for 2012/13 will be finalised at the full Youth Council meeting in September. It is intended that the Action Plan will be reviewed in 2015 in line with the Long Term Plan.

Financial Considerations

- 14 In 2011/12 the Action Plan was funded from the existing Social Wellbeing budget, Democratic Services budget and was supplemented with external funding from the Ministry of Youth Development, Creative Communities and the Waikanae Community Board. The Council received \$60,000 from the Ministry of Youth Development for two of the Action Plan initiatives in 2011/12; Youth2U Live and ThinkBIG.
- 15 In 2012/13 the Action Plan will be funded from existing Council budget and will be supplemented by funding from ACC and the Ministry of Youth Development. Due to the success of the Action Plan's ThinkBIG project, we have been offered \$10,000 from the Ministry of Youth Development to support another round of this project beginning. The second round of ThinkBIG will commence in February 2013.
- 16 The Waikanae Community Board also provided \$6000 supplementary funding for the Youth Council to strengthen delivery of the Youth2ULive programme in the Waikanae community. Exceptionally high volunteer involvement in the programme meant there was a \$2000 saving from this funding for the 2011/12 financial year. The Board has agreed that the under spend could be retained into the 2012/13 year to increase Youth2ULive activities during the summer months in Waikanae.
- 17 Youth2ULive will continue with funding from the Social Wellbeing budget during the summer months.
- 18 The Youth Council received \$2000 from the Creative Communities Scheme for funding for a District-wide Mural Project which sits under the Action Plan. This project sits under Goal One of the Action Plan. Two murals were completed as a result of this funding in June 2012.

Delegation

- 19 The Environment & Community Development Committee has the;
 - 7.1 Authority to develop (within any wider existing strategic framework) policies and work programmes that support the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of the community and provide assurance to Council that associated projects are managed efficiently, effectively and with due regard to risk.

Consultation

- 20 To ensure the Action Plan activities continue to be responsive to youth needs, the Youth Council undertakes ongoing consultation with young people through a variety of media and methods. These include face to face discussions, surveys and facebook interaction. Each activity of the Action Plan is developed with consultation with those young people who is seeking to benefit or directly affects. For example, a skatepark development was discussed directly with users at the park and a broader youth group through facebook discussions.
- 21 The Youth Council's facebook page is highly effective in engaging with young people in the District and ensuring that the Action Plan stays responsive to the needs of young people. They have over 800 members and posts are commonly viewed by a wider group of youth. Both Youth Council projects and relevant Council information and short consultations are often posted with a positive response rate.

Policy Implications

22 The goals and activities in the Action Plan provide a foundation for all activities undertaken or supported by the Council which relate to youth and youth development.

Tangata Whenua Considerations

23 The Action Plan is underpinned by the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi. The Youth Council aims to ensure tangata whenua representation in their membership and their projects are inclusive of rangatahi Māori needs.

Publicity Considerations

24 The Action Plan publication continues to be promoted to young people and the wider community particularly through events and activities held in association with the Youth Council. Additional media and promotion marketing strategies will be adopted in relation to key projects for 2012/13.

RECOMMENDATIONS

25 That the Committee notes the activities undertaken in the 2011/12 financial year included in report SP-12-665, and endorses the activities for 2012/13 and that progress on this Action Plan will be reported to the Committee on an annual basis and via the Long Term Plan review process.
