## 1. May I ask who decided on the new name for Waikanae Library?

The name Te Ara Whetu was gifted to the new building by Te Atīawa ki Whakarongotai iwi. ## 2. Has there been any community consultation?

There has been extensive community consultation throughout the site selection, approach, needs and design planning process. The name was not consulted on because it was a gift.

## 3. In relation to my request has consideration been given to 'Waikanae' being a Maori name/word and 'pukapuka' being the Maori meaning for books?

'Wharepukapuka' is a word used often within the library and Council. It is a basic descriptor (ie. Whare(house) + pukapuka(book)). Anyone describing Te Ara Whetu as the Waikanae Wharepukapuka will be correct, but the building will also be offering much more to the surrounding community, so in that sense, as a name, it would not represent the fullness of services and opportunities the building offers.
