The proposal two changes, \$7.6m roading being changed to property's capital value. THIS I DON'T AGREE WITH. When we were looking for a house to buy 26 years ago it was cheaper for us to buy a property outside of town and build a very small house I think it was about 60 to 70 square metres at the time. As our family has grown so to has our house and mortgage. (meaning sacrifices and tightening our finances to needs and not wants) Now our house is worth a lot more than if we lived in town, but that doesn't mean we have more money to spend. We have been a two income family so that we can make ends meet and pay our bills. The value of the house doesn't always determine how much money a person has or is earning. Just like people thinking when you drive a brand new car that you are loaded, but in reality young ones now are spending their saved money on a car because they can't get into the house market. (I know a guy who works for Toyota and this is what they are all saying as they are buying brand new cars/Utes). Not that we can afford a new car, all our cars are old unfortunately.

Just because you live in a more expensive house doesn't mean you use the roads more. We work hard, have done without the luxuries in life to get where we are, while others are drinking, smoking and living it up in the weekends, going on holiday etc, we stay home and don't spend that kind of money. I do understand that some people struggle financially. Why should I pay for someone else's part of the roading when they choose to live in a cheaper house but are earning the same if not more money than us.

A fairer system is to up the amount for everyone by about \$10 per house hold per year and those who struggle financially can apply through a budgeting service or apply directly to the council with evidence of hardship to get a discount on their rates.

I am emailing to introduce myself and the Service I manage on behalf of Hutt Valley DHB. We hold the Ministry of Health contract for the Wellington Regional Dental Service which includes Wellington, Hutt Valley and Kapiti-Mana. We offer free dental care from birth through to 18 years of age, but target specifically children aged 2 to 13 years. Dental caries (decay) is one of the most common chronic conditions affecting New Zealand children. It accounts for a large number of hospital admissions in our region. It is also one of the most preventable diseases that we can tackle in health and across communities. Poor oral health affects children's development, school performance and behaviour.

We have over 6400 children enrolled in the service for the Kapiti area (pre and primary school aged); Kapiti is served by 2 Dental hubs and 2 Dental vans currently. You may be aware that for the past 12 months during the school holidays, we have been running a drop in clinic from one of our dental vans based at Te Rauaparaha Arena in Porirua , in order to specifically target our children that struggle to access the dental service during school term time. The success of these programmes has seen the Service expand this holiday programme during 2018 to include Wellington, Lower Hutt and Upper Hutt sites (with required plugs being funded by the respective councils).

As part of this initiative we are constantly looking for new ways to increase our visibility and access for families in our communities, including Kapiti. In order for us to offer this drop-in mobile service during the holiday term time, we need access to a special adapted plug which needs to be installed by a certified electrician, in an area that we can access but that won't be open to vandalism (usually high on a wall or in the roof eaves).

I was hoping that you may be open to having a discussion as to whether Kapiti Council would be able to fund the installation of one of these plugs at a more central location in Paraparaumu, for example, Coastlands Aquatic Centre, where walk through traffic on school holidays would be high? The cost of parts and installation is \$1200 and it would mean that every school holiday we can be based centrally in Paraparaumu to work with the Kapiti community, on eradicating dental caries and building on the health promotion work we do already both at the Dental Hubs and through the Mobile Vans for schools.

I look forward to hearing from you.

In general yes but, just as managing our own personal and household budgets, only those that are affordable. There is much self congratulation when rates increase by ONLY some percentage but every year they increase unlike most incomes.

Our financial and infrastructure strategies (Pages 10-13)

The Council plans to pay down debt, reduce borrowings and target infrastructure spending for resilience and growth. What are your views on this approach?

Again, only what is affordable. I doubt we can afford to fully fund depreciation of assets over five years without ever increasing the rates. I also wonder at the deprecation model and how realistic it is given the development of new infrastructure materials and manner of installation. There seems to be no real effort to manage spending within the income. The wage and salary bill alone is outrageous partly, I suspect, due to grandiose job titles and salary expectations that go with them; with no sign of accountability for poor performance. We have someone playing the dirivative market with interest swaps but I have seen no indication any true (not hypothetical) gain or loss from this gamble. Who approved this?

Comments:

Since I moved here in 2004 interest rates on term deposits have fallen from %10 to %3.6. In that time my KCDC rates have increased by 99%. We get a lot of self congratulation but no effort to live within the rate income. There a many more people living here now so the rates income will increase each year without a corresponding increase in core spending. It is a disgrace and counils need to think if this was my personal money while I might like a new (eg acquatic centre) would I think it was a good use for my earnings. Profigate is a word that comes to mind.

We have a lot of words on the lifestyle in Kapiti but also a lot of small minded bureacrocacy in the Council, think back to the disgraceful tree saga, and here we again effectively trying to shut down the harmless and very nice market based on the Food Act. Another playground for senseless bullying.

Where we're heading (Page 8)

Considering our challenges and constraints, do you think we're focusing on the right 10-year outcomes?

Yes, I support the plan to be more fiscally prudent. But the emphasis on stormwater management without first deciding on a climate change strategy is bizarre. Why spend \$83 million protecting homes, some of which may need to become part of a managed retreat strategy? There should also be serious exploration of new revenue sources apart from graduated property taxes (rates). For instance, consumption taxes which are more equitable as users pay. In the United states there are local taxes, an idea which might be considered here to promote equity.

Our financial and infrastructure strategies (Pages 10-13)

The Council plans to pay down debt, reduce borrowings and target infrastructure spending for resilience and growth. What are your views on this approach?

I applaud the council's ambition to be more fiscally prudent. But as mentioned above, there is a lack of innovation with regard to widening sources of income. It is unfair and unimaginative to always expect those living on expensive land, often through no choice of their own, to pay for all the communities costs. Annual hefty rates increases, well above the 'average' figure, are unsustainable and unfair, especially to those on fixed incomes, or retirees. As the consultation document points out, we have a greater proportion of these people than other areas, so why not develop revenue sources aligned with our distinctive demographic?

Key decision (Pages 14-17)

Should we change the way we share rates across the district?

Do you agree with the Council's preferred option to change the rating system?

Please tell us why:

I don't support either of these options which are but two of the many options that could be considered, but aren't even listed. How about a district fuel tax to fund roading? And what about a local consumption tax on purchases to spread the burden of services across the entire community? At present, a small proportion of property owners are expected to fund all residents services. And the council now plans to increase property taxes still further to pay for roading, suggesting it will be more equitable and promote affordability. In reality, it will do the opposite.

Please tell us why:

As mentioned earlier, stormwater and climate change are interconnected issues. Yet we have an expensive plan to enhance stormwater facilities, and protect homes (though it is not clear how this will be done) without any climate change strategy. It may be a difficult challenge, as Jenny Rowan discovered, but at least she tried! There is no evidence of any serious thinking about this central concern which will have major implications for the entire district. We need some real political leadership to address this issue, determine a strategy, then align other policies with it.

Work on the go (Pages 21-23)

Any comments on the matters below:

Coastal hazards and climate change

This isn't addressed in the consultation document, except to say 'we will start thinking about this soon'.Yet, as argued above, it is the most important issue of our time. How we manage climate change and coastal hazards should determine how we deal with housing, rates, stormwater etc. This will require stronger leadership than we are presently witnessing.

Housing

It isn't a local authority's function to provide housing.

Replacing the Paekakariki seawall

We have a planned seawall replacement, which may not work, but no overarching climate change policy. Furthermore, we need to be sure that the seawall doesn't exacerbate erosion at either end, which is often the case. Communities change and move over time as history shows. A seawall is a denial of this.

Paraparaumu and Waikanae town centres

The history of the Kapiti Coast clearly shows that development follows the dominant transport system, First the beach, then the coaches, followed by the railway, then roads. Spending millions to enhance town centres eclipsed by the expressway won't work and defies the lessons of the past.

Kapiti Island gateway

This is a welcome idea which requires council leadership to achieve it. Council services such as design, consents, parking, roading reconfiguration, etc should be capitalised to provide a cashless contribution. it doesn't have to be too grand. Ramaroa in QE Park is an example to emulate. it cost just \$1.6 million. Apply to the Regional Development Fund for central government support.

Rates for 2018/19 (Pages 24-25)

Comments:

Citing an 'average' figure is meaningless when we have a graduated property based tax system. in fact, many ratepayers face annual increases of about 12% p.a as a result of increasing property values (which they can do nothing about), annual local and regional rates increases, and new revenue enhancement tactics such as the proposed change to how roads are rated. It is time to be innovative and look for other ways to obtain council income. Fresh ideas such as a local fuel levy, and consumption based taxes such as are common in the United States. Again, the lack of dynamic leadership is apparent.

The rates remission policy is an ambulance at the bottom of the cliff! It is also demeaning for residents to have to beg for relief from excessive rating. A far better solution would be to look at how to spread the burden of local services across the entire community - not just one easy targeted sector, the property owners. As with all these issues, the lack of genuinely thoughtful and innovative leadership is apparent.

One of the major expenses outlined in the consultation document is roading, showing an expected cost of about \$33million, yet there is no explanation of what these projects are; 'Major Community Connectors' and 'East-West Connectors programme'. We already have both of these in the Expressway (north /south) and Kapiti, Te Moana and Mill-Otaki Roads (east/west). Combine that with the withdrawal of the proposed \$32 million expenditure to try to save eclipsed town centres and we can reduce planned expenditure by \$75 million. Perhaps policies such as these should be re-considered before once again raising rates. As mentioned earlier, thoughtful and imaginative leadership is required to face the future.

The assumption that people who own more expensive houses should pay more rates is based on the supposition that they have more disposable income, however with 26% of the population in Kapiti being over 65 I would suggest that a high percentage of these people are on a relatively low fixed income. This creates a real burden, but maybe more importantly a sense of unfairness. Having retired to Kapiti for the once affordable lifestyle they now have to stop spending in local businesses as they scrimp to pay their rates bill. This means that local businesses begin to lose sales. The proposed change to how KCDC shares the rates across the district (the proposed changes to the district wide roading rate adds a further financial burden on people who are already paying more rates based on their property value. I would like to see the evidence that people in more expensive houses use more council services and in this case roads/footpaths and non existent cycleways. I sense this proposed change is creating a level of resentment and anger among a significant portion of KCDC rate payers as it is fundamentally unfair. This is the part that most upsets me. This should continue to be a fixed charge. I could understand if heavy vehicles were charged more for the damage they do or boy racers for the damage that they cause, but to arbitrarily get me to pay more due to my properties capital value is unfair. As a cyclist I have a really low impact on Kapiti roads and yet I am being asked to pay more than my fare share.

Introduction

- This submission into the Kăpiti Coast District Council (Council) Long Term Plan (LTP) is on behalf of the mana whenua of Te Whakaminenga o Kăpiti (TWOK); Te Ătiawa ki Whakarongotai, Ngã-Hapū-o-Ōtaki [Ngãti Raukawa ki te Tonga] and Ngãti Toa Rangatira (ART).
- 2. The development of this submission has been guided by the following key principles:
 - a. There are many issues where the interests and priorities of mana whenua and Council overlap.
 - TWOK recognises the importance of identifying and reducing the financial, legal and reputation risk to Council in their LTP.
 - c. The input of mana whenua enhances the long-term strategic strength of an LTP as there are some matters where mana whenua are best placed to provide insight and strategic direction.
 - d. Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai, Ngāti Raukawa ki te tonga and Ngāti Toa Rangatira are the mana whenua of the Kāpiti District and have their tino rangatiratanga guaranteed through Article Two of Te Tiriti o Waitangi.
- TWOK have identified four priority matters for this LTP and will comment on the relevance and implications of these for the LTP and will accordingly make some recommendations to address these priorities. The four priorities are as follows:
 - Managed Retreat; efficient spending that reduces the risk to life posed by climate change.
 - Solid Waste Disposal; ensuring that Council maintains control over the sustainability of Kapiti's waste disposal.
 - c. Affordable Housing; enabling Council to play its part in increasing the availability of affordable housing.
 - d. Environmental Standards; ensuring that Council are able to meet legal requirements to achieve heightening environmental standards.
- In light of those priorities, TWOK will respond to the specific questions put out in the LTP consultation document.

Managed Retreat; efficient spending that reduces the risks to life posed by climate change

Sea-level rise and increased rainfall is a consequence of climate change. As stated in the LTP consultation document, more than a quarter of Käpiti properties are at risk of being flooded in 1-in-100 year event. However, sea level rise of 20 centimetres projected for the next 20 years could mean a 100 year king tide event could now occur every 3 years.¹

- Kăpiti urgently requires a strategy for managing the retreat of people, residences and infrastructure from high risk areas in order to ensure that predictable loss of life, civil emergencies and significant economic loss are avoided.
- TWOK recognises that managed retreat requires collaboration across multiple agencies and that District Councils' contribution to managed retreat is limited to specific areas, such as regulating new development, decision-making around asset management, and notification of hazards.
- 8. TWOK also recognises the specific role mana whenua play in the District's resiliency. The marae is already recognised as a focal point of civil society through its use for citizenship ceremonies on the Kāpiti Coast. TWOK also see marae and urupā being critical to resiliency in that marae, urupā and the connected whānau, hapū and iwi organisations provide critical support and resources in responses to civil emergency. Long-term planning should ensure that marae and urupā are adequately resourced to continue to support this resiliency.

Recommendation 1: Council work collaboratively to support the development of a Managed Retreat Strategy which identifies the risks posed to Kāpiti by climate change and the work programme required to implement managed retreat in the District, including the involvement of mana whenua in civil emergency response.

Solid Waste Disposal; ensuring that Council maintains control over the sustainability of Käpiti's waste disposal.

- The contract Council currently holds for the disposal of waste provides it with little autonomy over how waste is disposed of and a key outcome of this is poor sustainability of the overall regime of waste disposal.
- 10. Principally TWOK believe that waste should be disposed of sustainably, and where possible within our own District. Kāpiti's solid waste is currently sent to Hokio Landfill which has a long history of non-compliance evidenced through years of abatement notices and fines for breaches in compliance. The landfill received three notices of non-compliance in 2017 alone. Acknowledge that there are district and regional landfill issues, what are the issues with waste, it's an issue for everyone therefore caring for the environment belongs to all.
- 11. The landfill has such a poor reputation that it is currently the subject of a Waitangi Tribunal Inquiry WAI 2200, where Council's complicity in not addressing non-compliance will soon be heard publicly. Through the Tribunal Inquiry, mana whenua have been made aware of accusations of corruption being made against Horowhenua District Council's management of the landfill and TWOK consider that connection to the landfill creates significant reputation risk to Council.
- TWOK is conscious of the fact strategies for waste minimisation are the most successful means of limiting the impacts of waste. However, TWOK are also conscious that there is a

responsibility to ensure that the of waste that is generated by the District, both currently, and upon the implementation of waste minimisation, must be disposed of in a way that is acceptable to the public.

13. The preference of mana whenua would be to immediately break its contract with a provider that continues to dispose of waste in Hokio Landfill. To date the response from Council to this request has been that the cost of doing this is too high. TWOK require that Council report on what the cost of this would be. If the cost of this is prohibitive, TWOK would in the very least require that upon the expiry of the existing contract for solid waste disposal, that Council have the ability to negotiate with a future service provider that waste is not disposed of at Hökio.

Recommendation 2: Council will require that disposal at a sustainable alternative to Hökio landfill is a condition of the next contract they sign for solid waste disposal.

Affordable Housing; enabling Council to play its part in increasing the availability of affordable housing.

- 14. Kăpiti is subject to some of the highest increases in house prices in the country, making housing affordability a key issue for the District. Housing availability and affordability issues are set to be exacerbated by the completion of road of national significance projects, as we have already seen through the construction of the M2PP expressway.
- 15. There are a range of potential solutions to the issue, particularly given the current political climate and the interest in the issue from central government agencies such as Te Puni Kökiri. TWOK wishes to work with Council to take advantage of any opportunities to access financial relief for the costs involved in developing Maori and other public land into affordable housing.
- 16. Council has a specific role to play in ensuring that the planning framework for the District supports and provides for solutions to this problem. The Office of the Auditor General notes that zoning particular areas of Māori land for housing as 'papakāinga zones' makes housing in that land on average \$10,000 cheaper for each house. It also provides the certainty to those who wish to develop housing in those areas which is required to incentivise the development of housing.² It also helps to remove a barrier to the development of Māori land which has historically limited the productivity of that land.
- 17. TWOK is aware that specific Māori technical planning capability will be critical to any initiative to create papakāinga opportunities and sees the 'Joint Iwi Management Plan' project and the implementation of 'Te Haerenga Whakamua' as critical work programmes to support such affordable housing initiatives.

Recommendation 3(a): Council and TWOK develop a joint strategy to work with Crown agencies to secure financial relief for the development of affordable housing especially on 'Maori land.

Recommendation 3(b): Council work with mana whenua to develop a Papakainga Plan Change to the District Plan.

Environmental Standards; ensuring that Council are able to meet legal requirements to achieve heightening environmental standards.

- 18. The deteriorating state of freshwater in Aotearoa New Zealand has led to the introduction of requirements for freshwater management to achieve higher environmental standards within both the central and local government policy framework, specifically within the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management and the Proposed Natural Resource Plan for the Wellington Region. Specifically, TWOK support the vision of ensuring freshwater in the District swimmable and able to support mahinga kai.
- 19. As noted in the LTP consultation document, this creates specific management considerations for Käpiti; we are relatively unique in that much of our stormwater network is in reality a network of open watercourses, whose water quality is subject to those higher standards.
- 20. The LTP consultation document mentions that Council's stormwater monitoring programme focuses on the effects of stormwater discharges on mahinga kai and Māori customary use, however TWOK is not aware that such a programme is in fact in place. In the least, Council is obviously aware that they will need one, and this will require a significant increase in Māori technical input into the development and management of this programme.
- TWOK request that the Infrastructure team provide a report to them on the budget for this monitoring programme.

Recommendation 4: Initiate the implementation of an environmental and mahinga kai monitoring programme for stormwater in Kāpiti.

Responses to specific LTP consultation questions

- 22. The 10-year outcomes which Council is consulting on are listed below. In particular, given the managed retreat, solid waste and environmental standard priorities of TWOK, and their importance from a District-wide perspective, there should there an emphasis on infrastructure investment being sustainable. Hence, TWOK propose the following change to the 10-year outcomes
 - a. Improved financial position against financial constraints
 - <u>Sustainable</u> infrastructure investment that supports resilience and agreed growth projections
 - c. Improved accessibility of Council services
 - d. A positive response to our distinct district identity

- 23. Additionally, regarding Council's financial strategy, TWOK believe that infrastructure spending should be sustainable in the long-term, with the impacts of climate change being carefully considered. TWOK do not wish to see Council spending on existing and new infrastructure which may no longer have the intended life-span given the increase in storm surges and flood intensity.
- 24. Therefore, whilst TWOK supports the acceleration of the flood risk programme to 45 years as proposed, they believe that the implementation of the programme should involve careful analysis of the sustainability of investing in flood risk works, given the change of stormwater patters that will result from development and climate change.
- 25. TWOK have also discussed that in the future, a portion of key infrastructure spending may have to be funded through rates targeted at those who will directly benefit. TWOK anticipates that the way in which infrastructure at risk from climate change impacts is funded will inevitably require more debate in the future long-term planning of the Council.
- 26. Regarding the proposed changed to rating, i.e. reducing the proportion of fixed-rate charges and introducing a targeted commercial rate; TWOK is strongly in support of rating policy that prioritises the affordability of rates for lower incomes families, and therefore is in support of this change to rating.
- Finally, TWOK will seek to have Mahina-a-rangi Baker provide a presentation to Council in order to speak to this submission.

In your blurb you talk about, " that our rating system is equitable and affordable for our ratepayers, and sustainable for Kāpiti," Changing to a system that is based on Capital value is not at all equitable, and is not necessarily affordable for all property owners. Each ratepayer should pay an amount that divides the cost of roading across all properties EQUALLY. People in higher value properties do not use the road more than people in lower value properties. Also higher value properties do not necessarily indicate higher ability to pay extra rates. Even people using public transport need to provide for the roads that Buses use as buses cause more damage to roads than private cars because of their size and weight. If this change is adopted it will penalize rural property owners over residential areas as they depend on the roads in their area and they have little option to use public transport, and because of remoteness to commercial areas cannot easily use bikes or walk. Even pedestrians need to make a contribution to the footpaths and bridges that have been constructed for foot travel. This suggested option is not equitable and does not show a commitment to equality and affordability as suggested by the Kapiti Coast District Council in its "Building a Stronger Kapiti Together" document.

Citizen's Advice Bureau Kapiti Submission to Kapiti Coast District Council Long Term Plan 2018-2038

At the invitation of the Mayor, Citizens Advice Bureau Kapiti (CABK) would like to make a submission to the Kapiti Coast District Council's Long Term Plan 2018-2038. Our organisation and volunteers have had a long relationship with Kapiti Coast District Council and the Kapiti community, spanning more than 20 years, and we hope to be able to continue as a partner with KCDC working towards to the overall wellbeing of Kapiti residents with support through the LTP. CAB Otaki is a separate organisation and may also wish to make an independent submission.

CABK is an independent incorporated society and a member of the Citizens Advice Bureau New Zealand.

We work with all the diverse sectors of this community, young and old, at every socio economic level. Despite this we have been told "the internet will make us redundant". In fact the opposite is the case: as life becomes more complicated and challenging, we are seeing ever more people coming through our doors with problems that appear insoluble and cannot be helped on line. Many of our clients have little or no access to the Internet and for many, literacy skills are limited and assistance is required to deal with the complex issues they face.

It is the more deprived sector of our region that has most trouble routinely dealing with the problems of life in Kapiti today - the unemployed, the homeless, the elderly. Our older clients in particular also benefit from being able to visit us to receive help writing letters, filling in forms and accessing other secretarial help provided. This assistance enables some of the most vulnerable members of our community to deal effectively with government, banks, retailers and other service providers.

CABNZ has a contract with the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Enterprise to deliver services to new migrants to New Zealand under the Migrant Connect programme and CABK is one of 22 bureaux around New Zealand participating in this programme. The contract provides CABK with approximately \$11,000 per annum however MBIE has recently retendered the contract and there is a significant chance that this will be awarded elsewhere with a loss of revenue to CABK.

CABK provides assistance to Kapiti residents on matters closely aligned with KCDC's services such as fencing, trees and disputes with neighbours and as part of our submission to the LTP we would also point to the collaborative relationship we have with KCDC in other areas such as emergency response/civil defence, the housing forum and health advocacy.

Our reputation for providing impartial, non-judgemental help to the vulnerable has been built up over decades and cannot be compromised.

Other services provided through CAB Kapiti

In addition to providing free, confidential advice and support to clients on any topic, we provide free access to Justices of the Peace three times a week and to the Whitireia Community Law Centre every Wednesday. These clinics are always well subscribed and the law clinics in particular demonstrate how vital it is for our vulnerable clients to be able to access free legal help through our bureau. Seven law firms in Kapiti also work with us on a duty roster to help these clients.

Operational funding sought in LTP

Because we are 100% manned and run by volunteers with no paid staff, our reach is great but our financial needs are low compared to other NGOs. Accordingly we are requesting that KCDC considers allowing for funding in the Long Term Plan of \$15,000 per annum over the next three years to help us to continue to provide our services.

One off grant funding sought

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We have recently made the decision to improve the safe, confidential space that these clients need when they visit us, even though our funding was under threat and the cost of our new premises is higher. The fitout to date is basic and functional and additional funding is sought to improve the security, safety and privacy of our staff and clients.

Over many years council has depended extensively on the use of consultants with projects frequently failing to deliver. The council must look at the quality of the engineering and other technical staff it employs to ensure they cannot be "snowed" by consultant's proposals. eg failed sewage systems and facilities, the whole water supply debacle when sensible negotiation could have achieved an outcome to use water from the Otaki River catchment and pipeline south. The council must take heed of local community feelings eg the Waikanae Hedge debacle and apparent plans to bureacratise the self managing community market in Park Avenue.

Having moved recently to the Kapiti coast the rates are amongst the highest in the Wellington region with add on like water and now waste management raising rates even further. The recent changes to waste management are no better than the way Air NZ removed its service from the Kapiti coast. Has the coast developed a waste management plan/strategy? I understand that waste is trucked to Bonny Glen near Mart0n. The costs are likely to only increase over time. The Council should be offering a full recycling service rather than relying on private contractors. Regarding infrastructure spending does the council recover enough levies from developer whose developments add pressure on the existing infrastructure. Kapiti road planning is a dogs breakfast. There needs to be a complete overhaul of the traffic flows. Where is the centre of the Kapiti coast? the road planning needs to reflect the desire of the community rather than developers. in our case we walk to the shops at Paraparaumu Beach crossing the bottom of Kapiti road adjacent to the roundabout is a nightmare. Primary school children and us "ol doggies" cross this busy road without the protection of a pedestrian crossing. Tweaks to the infrastructure such as additional crossings adds to the safety and general environment on the coast, regarding the risk of natural disasters is there an integrated policy outlining the risks to the community to guide expenditure in this area? The intensification of development will have increased stormwater runoff are these areas paying for their additional contribution to the stormwater system??

Coastal erosion is the major threat facing the Kapiti community. Coastal rock barriers must be constructed to prevent loss of infra structure and property. This can be accomplished with a win-win solution by constructing a coastal seawall using rock topped with a public walkway (following the very successful example in New Plymouth). The coast is the primary attraction for visitors and residents. A coastal walkway/cycleway extending along the coast would not only be a popular attraction, but would also form the basis of an effective protective seawall limiting erosion. The walkway would connect QEII park to the proposed Marine Discovery Centre at Raumati Beach and the Kapiti Gateway project and Maclean Park at Paraparaumu Beach

Replacing the Paekakariki seawall

All coastal seawalls need to be strengthened. The effectiveness of rock/boulder structures can easily be appreciated at the end of the rock wall at Raumati South - QEII Park, where the unprotected sand dunes have eroded tens of metres in recent years while the rock barrier has been effective

Maclean Park

Maclean Park should be developed to link the urban area to the beach by establishing walkways and access points. It should not be developed as a stand alone park which would form a barrier between the community and the coast

Kapiti Island gateway

All development should enhance the links between the community and the coast/Kapiti Island. Development of the old Raumati swimming pools as a Marine Discovery Centre would be the jewel in the crown connecting community and coast.

The purpose of this submission from the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group is to request the Kapiti Coast District Council to include the provision and monitoring of "Health & Social Services" in the Kapiti Coast District Council's Long-Term Plan 2018 - 2038.

This request is made to support the work of the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group and to accord with the provisions of the Local Government (Community Well-being) Amendment Bill that is currently before the Governance and Administration Select Committee. The main objectives of this bill is to restore the purpose of local government to be "to promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities" [emphasis added]; to restore territorial authorities' power to collect development contributions for any public amenities needed as a consequence of development; and to make a minor modification to the development contributions power". It is forecast that this Bill will pass into law in mid 2019 or sooner.

The Kapiti Health Advocacy Group also requests Council's continued support by way of advocating on behalf of community's health issues that have come to the attention of Kapiti Health Advocacy Group from health providers, community groups and individuals.

The Kapiti Health Advocacy Group's Recommendations to council are:

 That the provision and monitoring of "Health & Social Services" be included in the Long-Term Plan 2018 – 2038.

2) That the Kapiti Coast District Council continues to advocate for increased health services closer to home due to distance to Kenepuru & Wellington Hospitals, our aged population, people with disabilities and increased numbers of young families moving to Kapiti.

 That Council continues to support the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group by way of Kapiti Coast District Council staff support around administration of the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group monthly meetings.

Chair's Report 1 March 2017 - 31 March 2018

Early 2017 Mayor Gurunathan requested we bring together people involved in the Health Sector in the Kapiti Coast District to find out what the Health Needs are for the people of Kapiti.

Mayor Gurunathan meets with Capital & Coast District Health Board and MidCentral District Health Board two to three times a year. To ensure the Mayor was informed when advocating for improved health services for the people of Kapiti, the Mayor needs to know the health status and the health needs in Kapiti.

The Kapiti Coast District has not had a community voice for Health since 2008 when Healthlinks was disbanded.

Hence the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group was formed to look at what health services are available and what health services are needed. CCCDHB & MidCentral DHB were invited to attend the monthly meetings. CCCDHB have attended all meetings since the inaugural meeting held on 22 March 2017 and MidCentral DHB have attended when required.

The Kapiti Health Coalition was formed out of the inaugural meeting of the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group and have gone on to get over 22,000 signatures for a Kapiti Community Hospital.

The Health group has had workshops looking at 'What is working well' what is not working so well', 'What health services are missing, Aged Care, Ambulance Services, Mental Health, Mental Health for Young People, Social Isolation and What Actions are required to be able to access Health Care Services closer to Home.

It has certainly been a demanding year with many Presentations by CCDHB and MidCentral DHB with lots of facts and statistics around what health services are available and the challenges for access and improved health services for the people of Kapiti.

Recommendations from the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group to be forwarded to Mayor Gurunathan.

 Mayor wrote to Hon David Clark requesting a Kapiti Representative be appointed onto the CCDHB Board - Minister replied to say contracts end December 2019 and if the Mayor has potential candidates to be appointed to forward their information to the Ministry of Health. Mayor wrote to Minister of Health requesting Professor Ron Paterson, Chair of the Inquiry into Mental Health and Addiction advising interest in participating in the inquiry and meeting with members - Minister replied in early stages of being established and our interest has been registered.
KHAG attended Mayor's Public Meeting on Meth/P. KHAG put in a Resolution to Angie Warren-Clark List MP for Labour. This submission was taken to the Paraparaumu/Raumti Community Board to write in support - carried unanimously.

There is still much work to be done, especially around setting the priorities for the Kapiti Health Advocacy Group Action Plan and ensuring that what our communities have identified to us as health needs are implemented without delay which will ensure improved health outcomes and access to health care by bringing services to the Kapiti Coast (closer to home).



KCDC Long Term Plan 2018-2038 submission

General observations

- The property owners of Kapiti are not to be considered as a cash cow to be milked dry every year to feed a bloated and inefficient council bureaucracy.
- The magnitude of Rates increases over the past decade to fund this as well as the magnitude of the increase sought this year has not been, and is not, acceptable.
- 3. We are tired of the constantly produced self-congratulatory fancy brochures, such as the one for this year's "consultation" which say in effect: "Aren't we doing well? But we need more and more of your money. Trust us."
- 4. The Mayor likes to promote Kapiti as being a retirement haven, but retirees rely mostly on pensions which do not increase every year by the extent of the Rates increases that the council consistently imposes.
- 5. If people could see major improvements to Kapiti public infrastructure from their Rates for the last decade they may be more willing to accept their annual forced contributions: but all they see are a few nice-to-have-but-non-essential extravagances such as the Aquatic Centre in Paraparaumu.
- 6. The structure of the council organisation is top heavy with several highly paid bureaucrats of questionable calibre and purpose while those who do work in the field are poorly paid. The council is, and has been for a decade, the leader of inequality in Kapiti.
- Despite the number of highly paid bureaucrats on the council payroll, time after time the council runs off to expensive Auckland or Wellington based consultants to tell it what to do. This alone raises questions about the suitability and competence of the senior staff.
- 8. Wastage on out-of-town consultants is particularly apparent with lawyers. Despite having a very highly paid in-house lawyer (Mr Power), you managed to spend \$694,000 in the last financial year on Auckland and Wellington lawyers, putting the total spend at well over \$1 million. This is ridiculous.
- 9. We yet again call for a thorough, comprehensive and independent peer review of the operation of the council with the objective of making it a lean and efficient organisation. This should result in a significant reduction in staff numbers, in particular, and thus a major cost reduction.

Specifics

10. "Economic Development." On page 17 of the LTP document it states: "The Council plans to spend \$2.7m in the next year on economic development activities." This is absurd. There should be no subsidies to businesses, and we have seen the wasteful consequences in the recent past. If it is economic for businesses to set up in Kapiti to service a market here that they perceive existing, they will do so. At present the excessive level of rates you take from Kapiti residents reduces the money they have available to spend with any business. This whole division of KCDC should be abandoned, saving from what you state, plus the cost of your in house "Economic Development Manager" around \$3.5 million in the next year.

- 11. "Waikanae and Paraparaumu Town Centres." On page 24 you state "The total budget allocated to the programme, from 2015 to 2033, is now \$32m." We say that there should be no more KCDC money spent in the Paraparaumu Town Centre as it has already had its fair share and does not need any more. In Waikanae the council should undertake rebuilding of the Mahara Gallery as soon as possible as it is a much needed project. We do not know what the intentions are for the Town Centre open spaces after existing work is finished; they need some, but not a lot of beautification, and the necessary budget for that should not be large.
- MacLean Park makeover. This again is a nice-to-have-but-non-essential extravagance. Do something about the ugly expanse of bitumen that pretends to be a duck pond. That is all.
- 13. Stormwater System Overall. We do not have sufficient information to be able to comment on what is essential and what isn't. However, it is not acceptable for flooding to occur from anything other than an event of monsoon proportions.
- Seawall. We concur than an effective seawall in the location mentioned is necessary, and can only express our hope that for \$17.7 million, the one proposed will be adequate and long lasting.
- Rating system. We propose that the best system from a fairness viewpoint is land value (unimproved site value) rating only.

Page6 – Keeping Council services affordable

It is NOT Council's role to redistribute wealth, that is done by central government through income taxes and benefits.

Changing government regulations needs government funding not sole reliance on ratepayers/Council users.

Council needs to garner support from the ratepaying public to add oomph to Local Authorities lobbying efforts to central government. Few ratepayers understand, let alone consider, the effect of central government mandating increasing compliance and regulatory work to LG. This information needs to get across to ratepayers in every local authority to generate a groundswell of support that central govt cannot ignore. I, for one, would be there for any Council asking for support.

Page 7 - Contributing to a vibrant district economy

I don't see this as a primary Council responsibility, it should primarily be focused on looking after who and what's here now and only secondarily on making it <u>easy</u> for people to bring new ideas and development. Ease the way, don't make the way.

One way I do agree Council can contribute to the local economy is by adopting a "buy Kapiti" policy. We should not be spending money outside the district if the same products/services are available here.

Page 8 - Improved financial position against financial constraints

Of course, this is a no-brainer. Our rates rises are not sustainable and our capacity to pay is finite.

Reduce debt - yes but it needs clear \$ and time-specific targets. It should never have been allowed to get so high.

Fully fund depreciation – a qualified yes. Extend the timeframe by 2 years to reduce the annual burden caused by past mismanagement. Can Council assure us that it will indeed be fully funded and we won't be asked to pay more because of accounting errors or the lack of peer review on estimates, quotes & tenders.

Spend less by prioritising – this should always be part of Council's mindset, non-negotiable. I have a finite capacity to pay, KCDC needs to spend in accordance with that not with a mindset that says there is an infinite capacity to tax and spend. I want a Council that is mean and lean administratively so all revenues are spent to the benefit of the community.

Page 9 - Infrastructure investment that supports resilience and agreed growth projections

What land and property assets does Council have. What income are these earning or capable of earning. Council must use our assets before investing in new. Look for where we can sell surplus assets or to generate a return on them with interested partners. For example the proposed Raumati Pools project and McLean Park where there is a business-friendly but unused kiosk.

Page 9 – Improved accessibility of Council services

Open for Business. Please explain. Does this mean open for the ratepayers, developers, residents, businesses of Kapiti or does it mean open for Council to do its own business? It often seems the latter. z_{ij}

We've experienced arbitrary interpretations and rulings by Council and Council staff. All interpretations and rulings should be on the side of the assisting the user, a default position of "yes, how can we make it happen" and helping Council users to massage projects for approval and not the current "no, the rule-book, as we interpret it, is everything".

Page 9 - A positive response to our distinct district identity

As a relative recent-comer to Kapiti, I'm not sure what our distinct district identity is. Wellington dormitory and beaches? To me, it is based on what nature has provided.

Why do we need "more people to see Kapiti as a great place to visit, live, work and start businesses"? What is missing? Are we chasing growth for it's own sake? I don't see that as a primary Council responsibility, it should primarily be focused on looking after who and what's here now and only secondarily on making it easy for people to bring new ideas and development. Ease the way, don't make the way.

Page 9 - An effective response to climate change in Kapiti

Climate change is well beyond the resources of our local community. Pressure should be brought to bear on central Government to provide financial assistance (see my point earlier about engaging ratepayers for support).

Do not waste our precious resources on temporary solutions such as the Paekakariki sea-wall.

Create a proper long-term plan for the entire district coastline. Encourage other councils to do the same then present to central government for prioritised funding for the whole country, including Paekakariki.

Page 10 - Living within our means - our financial strategy

The borrowing limits are too high and will lead to further impoverishment of residents and ratepayers as we have to meet uncertain interest payments. Review all works and funding to ensure they really are within our means.

Page 12 - Building what we need - our infrastructure strategy

A second Walkanae railway crossing is needed. Council should look at the opportunity provided by the subdivision development between and Hula Street as a possibility. Telling Walkanae East residents that they have an alternative route via Upper Hutt is ludicrous and unacceptable. Population increase in Walkanae East cannot be serviced by a single way in and out.

Page 13 - Major infrastructure projects proposed

Districtwide SH1 revocation - Very little is required here. This is a project looking to spend money rather than looking for what is needed and wanted.

Let's look at the decision about the works for the Waikanae SH1 road revocation. Traffic lights at Ngaio St are not needed, cycleway is not needed, removal of stone wall is not needed and potentially dangerous. Upgrading/beautifying the median strip is all the work required, add a round-about at Ngaio Road if you want but that's all. The rest of the money should be handed back to NZTA to use on other roading projects. I urge Council to take notice of the social media outpouring on this, cancel their past decision and have staff review what is really needed and wanted.

Page 14 – Should we change the way we share rates across the district?

Option A, although this is a forced choice showing a lack of thinking thoroughly, widely and deeply by Council. SUIP seems a reasonable proxy for actual road usage. Leave it as it is. It is NOT Council's role to redistribute wealth, that is done by central govt through income taxes and benefits.

Capital value is in no way a fair method for rating ever. I have just spent a considerable amount of post-tax income on improvements to my home. Council now wants to charge me again for that. There are other methods for setting targeted rates available to Council, under the Local Government (Rating) Act including building coverage that could be used in place of capital value and offer greater fairness. What other councils do is irrelevant – KCDC can be a guiding light in changing rating to take advantage of the other methods allowed under the act.

SUIP / RU are more aligned with user pays, the exact same principle Council touts as being fair for non-rate fees & charges.

Council claims option B will "improve affordability" but are simply proposing to redistribute wealth. Improving affordability for some must be reducing affordability for others. Rates should be aligned to service provision and use not capital value.

What does the community get from the \$2.7M spent on Economic Development? Where does this money go, what are the measurable objectives and how are they tracking? Again, is it Council's responsibility to promote business or to make it easy for people to do business. I say the latter.

Pages 18-19 - Stormwater

Option B but again this is a forced choice. If we are fully funding depreciation why would there be a need for further borrowings for this work?

Referring to the Walkanae map of stormwater works "Potential Upgrade Options: Walkanae Catchment" it appears that the potential damage is less than the cost to prevent the damage. Would it be cheaper to rely on insurance for these areas rather than spending our scarce resources?

From the LTP: Council's Preferred Option "Progressively increase the capacity of the stormwater network to protect all habitable dwellings to a 1:100 level". Is Council legislatively mandated to protect PRIVATE property – this is tantamount to a community-funded insurance that's not risk-weighted for premiums? If not, explain to PRIVATE property owners that they are at risk and need to take their own risk preventative measures such as insurance.

From the LTP I have grave concerns about this statement: "Increases in development contributions may be required to ensure the methods used to achieve hydraulic neutrality effectively avoid adversely affecting other properties in the catchment". This is in response to Council's own imperative to force hydraulic neutrality on new developments. How can further development contributions be required if hydraulic neutrality is the answer? If hydraulic neutrality adversely affects other properties it is not neutral by definition. This smacks of incompetence in policy and planning.

Pages 21-23 - Work on the go

I have only been in the district for 18 months but can already see that progress is exceedingly slow. It often seems that Council wants to make plans for us and not with us.

Three years to investigate the viability of a Kapiti Island Gateway? Kapiti Island is limited as to the number of visitors it can receive annually and does not warrant, nor need, a gateway on the mainland. It needs a biosecurity facility, small and effective that does that job and no more.

<u>The Kapiti Coast</u>, however, has no such limit and deserves a <u>Gateway</u> that is both an attraction in its own right and information hub for visitors and locals alike. It may attract third-party or partnership funding if it also offered and supported business opportunities for Kapiti.

Page 26 - Fees and Charges

Swimming lessons should be fully private funded. It is not Councils role to teach swimming.

Why do multi-entry pass discounts on swimming pools not apply to Seniors and CSC holders?

Food Act fees – these could be all but waived by Council if it chose for our market operators. I encourage this as Council's real contribution to a vibrant, interesting community.

I am shocked to see Council charges an admin fee on refunds. This is unjustifiable.

Application for Discretionary exemption (Schedule 1, Part 1, Section 2 Building Act 2004) - this fee is far too high for an exemption.

Copying/printing charges are too high given they are in addition to other charges.

Many fees include x hours of time. How are these arrived at and what happens if an application uses less than the charged time? For example: Subdivision charges – 2 lot – cover first 16 hours of time. What is done during these 16 hours and what happens to the fee if the work can be done in say, 12 hours instead?

Development Contributions

In general, I accept that some development contributions are necessary and desirable. However, they should be tempered by the cost of providing NEW assets that vest in Council. That is, there should be no double dipping whereby the developer pays for the subdivision infrastructure and pays again on the basis that Council Infrastructure has been extended and improved by these assets.

Similarly what is a reserves contribution for a 2-lot subdivision actually used for? Under the act, there are limited ways Council can use such a contribution. Are these being used to fund, say the McLean Park upgrade? In our area of Walkanae there are no reserves within 15 minutes walking that KCDC owns and administers yet we are required to pay over \$12,000 towards reserves.

Dear Mayor Gurunathan,

I refer to your undated letter headed "The proposed rates for your property for 2018/19....."

Firstly, thank you for this communication which was in advance of Council's decisions on the matters contained therein.

There are a few basic questions which I would appreciate answers to, namely;

 What is the actual and provable linkage between the dollar value of a residence and the amount of Council rates it should attract?

The increase in the value of a property has no impact upon usage of Council's services nor does it reflect any change in the rate payer's ability to pay increased rates.

in fact it could be argued that increases in property values only become tangible when the owner sells. For those of us who are retired and on fixed incomes any increase in value is meaningless and certainly does not assist us in paying higher rates.

It is my opinion that this mechanism is simply a revenue raising exercise for Council, without any sound rationale for its existence.

2. Why does Council need to raise rates well beyond inflation rather that keeping its own operational and administration cost increases under the inflation rate, as families and businesses have to do?

We live in economic times of low interest rates and low inflation; incomes are not rising beyond inflation, in most cases not even keeping up with it!

To talk about "...proposing an average rates increase of 4.7%..." and "..keeping rates increases between 2.9% and 5.5% per year..." is frankly not good enough in this economic climate with inflation under 2%. In my opinion it reflects poor financial management and a lack of willingness to make hard decisions on expenditure control.

In the real world of business and family life we have to control our expenditure within our income levels. Councils (and Governments) dream up what they want to spend and then levy the necessary rates and taxes on their "captive customers" to provide for their wish list expenditure. I believe this practice is neither economically sound nor responsible.

It becomes simple though for Council to refer to "Living within our means" doesn't it, as the "means" level is arbitrarily adjusted upward to match planned expenditure?

3. What amount of money has Council set aside over the last 20 years towards future capital spending, such as the mentioned "...significant asset renewal programme.."? Are current rate payers and those in the next decade or two carrying the burden of this spending and if so how is that equitable?

If there has not been appropriate funding set aside then previous rate payers have got off scot free and future ones, beyond the two decade term, will reap the benefits without sharing in the costs. This could reflect reliance on annual cash flow as the basis of budgeting expenditure rather than limiting expenditure and providing for future outlays, including debt reduction. The current level of debt is of great concern and must be reduced, not increased.

4. With the proposed rate increases does Council seriously believe that the stated aim of "Keeping Council services affordable" is meaningful when even at the current level of rates they are NOT affordable for many people?

With the ever increasing "user pays" model we are paying more and receiving less. Garbage collection is one example and please, do not consider setting up another administration fiefdom to run garbage collection in competition with external companies. As most of us are already paying for this external service we do not want Council to try to compete, which would be doomed to failure and cost us more in my opinion.

5. Will any new flood mitigation charges be targeted at specific properties rather than a blanket charge?

Those of us rate payers who have built homes in recent years have been required, at significant cost, to install in ground water tanks to take the rain water from the roof rather than sending it down the storm water system, so we have already contributed significantly to reducing the effect of water run off. We have again been hit with "user pays" costs when other rate payers have not. We should not have to pay twice.

It is my opinion that regardless of how many marketing brochures Council produces and how much it spends on consultants and spin doctors Council cannot be proud of its economic record and in terms of the old school report card wording "can do a lot better".

I really hope it does !

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed Kāpiti Coast District Council Long Term Plan 2018-38 Consultation Document and supporting information. Greater Wellington Regional Council (Greater Wellington) wishes to make the following comments.

Infrastructure

Greater Wellington acknowledges the financial cost of managing and improving infrastructure. We support managing infrastructure assets based on need, condition and importance, backed by a robust understanding of the state of assets and ongoing assessment through asset management programmes.

Greater Wellington supports continued investment in the information needed for resource consent processes, including wastewater and stream maintenance consents, which are coming up or already underway.

Security of the bulk water supply is an issue for the Kāpiti Coast. Greater Wellington supports the ongoing investigation into supply options, network upgrades and water conservation initiatives, including leak detection and repair.

Greater Wellington supports the allocation of funding to implement the outcome of investigations for the Otaki Wetland Discharge Treatment Project, and to examine the risks of wastewater overflows in wet weather events.

Stormwater

Greater Wellington supports the focus on stormwater flooding in the proposed Infrastructure Strategy. Stormwater flooding is, and will increasingly be, a significant hazard on the Kāpiti Coast. We support the increased funding and shorter timeframe proposed by the Kāpiti Coast District

is protected while meeting the economic, social and cultural needs of the community







Council (the Council) to address the risks of stormwater flooding, and look forward to working with the Council to ensure the community is safe and resilient to flooding hazards.

Greater Wellington supports the comprehensive assessment of the condition of the stormwater network. This will provide information for the second-stage stormwater consents required under the proposed Natural Resources Plan. We also support bringing forward spending on stormwater infrastructure once this assessment is complete.

Greater Wellington supports a catchment management approach to ensure development is appropriate and future-proofed for the effects of climate change. Greater Wellington also supports the Council's recognition that the quality of stormwater, and its effect on freshwater and coastal water, is important to the community. We are pleased to see that this is being addressed through the proposed stormwater management strategy, network consents, the management of any acute effects of stormwater and monitoring programmes associated with stormwater consents.

Greater Wellington asks that the Council's approach to stormwater management include appropriate measures in the District Plan to reduce the impacts, both in terms of quality and quantity, on receiving waters. Such measures include hydraulic neutrality, avoiding hazard areas and on-site retention of stormwater.

Greater Wellington supports global stream maintenance consents. These provide a framework to maintain the natural parts of the stormwater network in a way that retains the natural values, as wells as benefiting stormwater management.

Flood hazards

Greater Wellington welcomes the Council's aim to strengthen the on-going relationship with us by working together on a range of issues around flood risk management.

Greater Wellington strongly supports updating the district's flood hazard modelling and flood hazard maps in the early years of the plan. We look forward to continuing to work with the Council on an integrated approach to this work.

Natural hazards

Greater Wellington supports the Council's continuing involvement with the Wellington Region Natural Hazards Strategy. We also support the work being undertaken on coastal hazards and climate change. Greater Wellington asks that this work continue to be supported with adequate funding, particularly for research.

Greater Wellington supports addressing coastal hazards using a risk-based approach that enables the community to be aware of and adapt to eventual change. We also support the promotion of soft engineering approaches, rather than a continued reliance on hard engineering approaches.

Environmental Monitoring Strategy

Greater Wellington supports the intention to develop an environmental monitoring strategy. We would like the opportunity to be involved in this project, to avoid any duplication of effort. This is particularly important as the whaitua process commences work on setting water quality and quantity limits in the catchment.

Biodiversity

Greater Wellington supports the Council's commitment to the long-term outcome of improved biodiversity and environment through sustainable practices. We commend the Council on planting native sand-binding plants on the dunes between Paraparaumu and Ōtaki as part of its coastal restoration programme. We also support plans to restore the Tikotu Stream environment in Maclean Park. These activities are consistent with Regional Policy Statement Objective 16: Indigenous ecosystems and habitats with significant biodiversity are maintained and restored to a healthy functioning state.

Paekākāriki Seawall

Greater Wellington wishes to continue to be consulted about the design of the new Paekākāriki seawall, as it may affect the coastal margin of Queen Elizabeth Park.

Revocation of State Highway 1

Greater Wellington supports the increase in roading budgets to allow for maintenance of the sections of current State Highway 1 that are being revoked as a result of the Kāpiti Expressway. We would appreciate being kept abreast of developments so that public transport connections can be effectively managed, and suggest that the Infrastructure Strategy include an indication of the level of service to which the road will be maintained.

Town Centres and Connectors programme

Greater Wellington supports the decision to spread the Town Centres and Connectors programme over a longer timeframe. To allow public transport services to be planned effectively we would appreciate being informed of any changes to the timeframe for initiatives to improve connections to the Waikanae railway station and the Paraparaumu transport hub.

Reinstatement of transport assets subject to climate change effects

The Regional Land Transport Plan objective of: An increasingly resilient transport network contains a key improvement area of identifying key lifelines and transport infrastructure vulnerabilities. Greater Wellington supports reinstatement of assets that form a lifeline or critical access function. We would like to see a clearer framework for decision making around reinstatement, including the impact on community access.



Effects of coastal erosion on roads

Greater Wellington looks forward to collaborating with the Council and the New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA) to identify long-term options for managing the effects of coastal erosion on roads.

Impacts of earthquakes on transport assets

Greater Wellington supports active civil defence planning to reduce the impacts of a significant earthquake on transport assets. To ensure this work is done is a coordinated way, Greater Wellington encourages the Council to work with WREMO and other transport asset owners and providers, including KiwiRail, NZTA, and ourselves.

New subdivisions

While Greater Wellington supports funding maintenance associated with transport infrastructure for new developments, we suggest the Council consider greater integration with land use as a possible way to mitigate cost increases associated with new development. The Regional Land Transport Plan strategic objectives of: A well planned, connected and integrated transport and an efficient and optimised transport system that minimises the impact on the environment includes policies that:

Land use development will be well integrated with transport infrastructure, including denser development located around public transport nodes and along key public transport corridors to minimise dependence on private vehicles

The transport system will be managed and developed in a way that supports a compact, well designed and sustainable regional form, consistent with the polices of the Regional Policy Statement

Reduced reliance on motor vehicles, particularly single occupancy vehicles, will be supported through implementation of appropriate tools, measures and polices.

Greater Wellington notes the importance of considering public transport when planning urban form. We would welcome the opportunity to be involved early in the planning of new residential subdivisions so that public transport connections can be effectively managed.

Rail

Greater Wellington supports the construction of an emergency rail access south of Elizabeth Street in Waikanae (planned for 2018/19) to provide emergency vehicles with access to Waikanae East when the rail crossing at Elizabeth Street is temporarily blocked or closed. We also support the Council's work in monitoring and maintaining the Paraparaumu escarpment to reduce the risk of slips onto the railway lines.



Comments from the Wellington Region Emergency Management Office (WREMO)

WREMO is pleased to see the Council's investment in infrastructure to create more resilient communities and infrastructure insurance to help manage the cost of recovery after a significant event.

WREMO supports the Council's work with the community to identify the key issues and risks of climate change, with a particular focus on coastal hazard management.

WREMO also supports the Council's strong focus on resilience and looks forward to working with the Council to increase community preparedness and emergency response and ensure that the agreed levels of service are consistently met or exceeded.

WREMO suggests the text in the box on page three should be amended to say "WREMO levels of service are consistently met or exceeded in community preparedness and emergency response".




- 1. Dog Park
 - Paekakariki appears to be the only township without an existing or planned dog park.
 - The existing zones/times/seasonal dog rules in Paekakariki are restrictive and do not allow for many areas where dogs can fully exercise and socialise with other dogs.
 - · Creating a dog park in the Ames Street Reserve would both;
 - Protect the Blue Penguins as dog owners would be less tempted to allow their dogs to go lead-free there, and
 - Allow dogs in Paekakariki to socialise, which in turn would help improve dog behaviour

 I am proposing the unused area on the east side of the Ames Street reserve (south end of Ames Street) be fenced in as the dog exercise zone.



 Costs. This would <u>not</u> be a high cost project. The only costs would be for the fence, a gate plus signage.

- * The fence would need to have a close weave on the bottom to both prevent dogs getting out to the penguins and to prevent poisoned rabbit carcases getting in for the dogs.
- * The signage would need to specify that the park be only accessible to council registered dogs and those with all their immunisations, to avoid the risk of Parvo virus infecting the soil.
- * The gate would need to be wide enough to allow the Council lawn movers easy access.
- 2. Dog Hooks
 - The existing dog hooks located next to the Beach Road Notice Board are very useful, thank you. However they can only be used by 2 dogs at a time, to avoid fighting amongst unfamiliar dogs.
 - Would it be possible to have similar hooks outside Finns, on Beach Road, and outside the Library (Wellington Road), please?




- 3. Dog Doo Bins
 - In Queen Elizabeth II Park (track south starting from Beach end of Makays Crossing) there is a specific Doggy Doo Bin.
 - Would it be possible to include these around Paekakariki Township? There appear to be a significant number of dog owners not scooping their dogs poop, which is
 - * Dangerous to small children due to the parasites in the poop,
 - can give other dogs worms (if they come into contact with it),
 - Is unsightly. When Transmission Gulley is open Paekakariki will need to encourage more tourists. A township with dog doo along the street will not do so.
 - Obvious Dog Doo bins (labelled as such) would act as a reminder to dog owners whilst on a walk and so encourage them to scoop and dispose of their dogs poop.
 - The bins would need to be designed with small apertures to discourage the disposal
 of general household waste by freedom campers etc.

Waste Management

I appreciate that the privatisation of waste management has already occurred in Kapiti. However it appears to have assumed that all households produce at least 1 wheelie bins worth of land-fill waste per week when the contract was negotiated. It is now apparent that this is not the case.

Many of our local households have been actively working in recent years to reduce their land fill by increasing their recycled waste. So, when land fill waste goes down recycling waste goes up (simplistic chart, below)



The private waste management companies are offering with their smallest wheelie bins only a green crate for recycling, thus assuming that landfill waste and recycling produced will be equal.

I would like to ask KCDC to make a contract change requesting that the Private Waste Management companies provide Recycling Bins at the end of the major Streets in the Township to enable the trend of increased recycling to continue. These bins would need to be located in visible places, e.g. at the end of lanes, to prevent people dumping household land fill waste in them. There would also need to be signage stating that this facility would be removed if landfill waste was found in the bins, which would force the residents to "take ownership" of the bins and keep an eye on them.

The Council has stated that its' aim is to provide landfill management that meets best practice and environmental guidelines. However the private waste management companies are solely concerned in profit, and if they were to encourage us to decrease our landfill waste they would lose business and so are not motivated.

Weed Spraying

There is a significant amount of Wandering Jew plant (Tradescantia fluminensis) along the Sand Track pathway. It overhangs the path and as it is harmful to dogs (causes skin rash) could this be removed, please?

Submission to the Kapiti Coast District Council Long Term Plan 2018-2038

The Citizens Advice Bureau Otaki (CABO) wishes to make a submission to the Kapiti Coast District Council's Long Term Plan 2018-2038. Our organisation and volunteers have had a long relationship with Kapiti Coast District Council and the Otaki community, spanning more than 20 years, and we hope to be able to continue as a partner with KCDC working towards the overall wellbeing of Otaki residents with support through the LTP.

We work with all the diverse sectors of the Otaki community, young and old, at every socio economic level. Otaki is the most deprived and vulnerable community in the area served by KCDC according to recent demographic statistics, with Maori comprising 28% of the population. It is the more deprived and vulnerable members of our community who have most trouble routinely dealing with the problems of life in Otaki today - the unemployed, the homeless, those with mental health issues and the elderly. Our older clients in particular benefit from being able to visit us to receive help writing letters, filling in forms and other secretarial help provided at no cost to them. CABO provides assistance to Otaki residents on matters closely aligned with KCDC's services such as fencing, trees and disputes with neighbours.

We have been told "the internet will make us redundant". In fact the opposite is the case: as life becomes more complicated and challenging, we are seeing ever more people coming through our doors with problems that appear insoluble and cannot be helped on line. Many of our clients have little or no access to the Internet and for many, literacy skills are limited and assistance is required to deal with the complex issues they face.

Our reputation for providing impartial, non-judgemental and responsive help to the vulnerable has been built up over decades and cannot be compromised.

Other services provided through CAB Otaki

In addition to providing free, confidential advice and support to clients on any topic, CAB Otaki works closely with a local solicitor, JPs, the Horowhenua Community Law Centre (HCLC), the Adult Literacy Centre, the Curtain Bank, Transition Towns, the Budgeting Service, Food Bank, the Women's Health Centre, Otaki MenzShed, the Otaki Mail newspaper, the Primary Health Organisation, MSD and member organisations of the Community Forum. CABO hosts regular clinics for HCLC, Age Concern, a Ministry of Housing representative and, in the lead up to the end of the tax year, Inland Revenue Department.

Operational funding sought in LTP

Because we are 100% run by volunteers with no paid staff, our reach is great but our financial needs are low compared to other NGOs, with rent being the major component of our annual expenses. Accordingly we are requesting that KCDC considers allowing for funding in the Long Term Plan of \$12,000 per annum over the next three years to help us to continue to provide our services.

Additional funding sought

CABO is actively exploring options to become more self –reliant and sustainable. We are developing a plan to reach out to the local business community and to engage more proactively with other service providing organisations in our community.

However, we are limited by the time and energy of our volunteers to achieve a successful outcome. CAB Otaki is therefore seeking a one off \$6,000 to hire a contractor with marketing experience for a six month period to help us set up appointments, arrange meetings and events and to provide active follow up with potential partners and supporters.

I attended a meeting at which Mayor Gurunathan spoke on the matter of bylaws. Mayor Guru was of the opinion that enforcement of bylaws need not occur. The particular bylaws being discussed were dog restrictions and vehicles on beaches. Mayor Guru felt that good citizens would respect signage and that enforcement of bylaws would be costly to ratepayers. The more I thought about this, the more chagrined I became. It is simple to enforce bylaws - hire people to do so and pay them from the income. If a bylaw is not worth enforcing, why have it? You can counter the age-old argument of "revenue gathering" by advising complainers that a dollar of revenue gathered from people who ignore bylaws is a dollar less ratepayers must pay. In other words - there are fewer and fewer "good citizens" happily conforming with bylaws and more and more "mediocre citizens" ignoring them. Mayor Guru had some good points to make in his presentation but either the council must enforce bylaws (by issuing fines/warnings) or, if they are unenforceable get rid of them.

I would like Council to please continue their support of our Waitohu School Annual Fireworks display for the amount of \$3500 which is the costs for public services for this event ie toilets, security etc, please see attached letter. I would also like for Parks and Recreation staff to work with our school and committee on our playground, giving us advice and expertise, as we plan to put money in to our playground over the next few years. Waitohu School playground is the only playground on the Plateau in Otaki.

Dear Councillors,

On behalf of the Waitohu Home and school Assn I would like to ask you to continue to support our annual Fireworks Extravaganza with a contribution of \$3500 annually over the next 3 years.

Our Fireworks has been going now for over 25 years, and is very much a district wide event attracting people from Levin to Paraparaumu/Raumati. It is a costly and risky event to put on, and while some years we make money it is very weather dependent and some years without support of our community we make very little. It is a huge event to organise and manage due to it being a night-time event at a park location. We have in the past considered not running it due to poor return, as we can turn over \$10,000K at a Gala which is a low risk event held at our school. But we have decided that this is in fact a calender event for many, and a great event to have locally.

Our cost to run this event are approx. \$15,000 K before we make any money. The Fireworks display costs \$10,000, Toilets \$1,000, Staging and sound for the bands \$800, Security (Firefighters, Maori Wardens and Community patrol) \$800 and ST Johns \$100. Also some costs with compliance for power, food handling etc.

Over the years, when we have not had the best return, we have considered many things to cost cut or make more money, however we want our community to beable to afford to come and have a great night so we have kept our pre sell tickets at only \$5 PP (\$8 at the gate but \$5 for kids) preschoolers free. We have kept our bouncy castles at only \$2 per go, and made a profit of only about \$12 !!!! on this last year, but as a committee we do not want to charge too much because we want all the kids to be able to have a go on things. We have kept our food in house so as not to bring in the food carts that charge heaps for the same stuff we are selling. We are the only Fireworks display on the coast, and from this year in November the only one in Wellington.

We have been spending money on our playground recently, among other things, and our playground is used by many on the Plateau as there is no other playground in the area (this not due to council who tried to put one in in Mahanui Park and got community rejection).

Things our Home and School Contribute to in our school 1: Yr 5 trip to Kapiti Island 2: Matheletics program for all kids 3: Playground and pool upgrades 4: Classroom resources approx. \$5K per year 5: Assistance with Yr 6 camp and Yr 6 graduation lunch 6: 1 whole school bus trip to a place of learning per year 7: Sports uniforms 8: Kapa Haka uniforms 9: New sand pit cover 2017 10: School garden project, new garden boxes and planting of fruit trees at school. And many more. We could not continue this without running our two main events per year, our Fireworks and Gala, plus other fundraisers.

1. According to your suggested changes, our rates would increase. Other considerations should be given to people who have farms, small farms and other rural dwellers. Firstly, we provide all our own water services and sewerage systems. We do not have street lighting. Our large grassed road verges are cut ourselves. Our roads are poor, and only last year about 20 potholes were finally filled in down one stretch of one of our rural roads. There has been no resealing over the last 10 years even though there is a lot of heavy traffic on some roads. (logging trucks etc) . We attend to all our pest control, (rats, rabbits hares, stoats, ferrets. opossums, to protect our native bird and plant species). We have improved the Kapiti Coast environment by planting thousands of native trees to provide a habitat for our native birds, corridors for them to safely fly along, shade for our stream and the wildlife. (encouraging others in our area to do the same would be even more helpful). Rural rate payers should be given more consideration and acknowledgement for their contribution to the well being of the local environment rather than being charged more because overall their property values are higher because of larger areas of land. Urban areas need to carry more cost sharing as most of the services are used by them.

I found the plan hard to interpret - there's a lot of information in there and not being an economist or financial expert, it is difficult for me to comment on whether the 10 year outcomes being proposed are the right focus. I do hope that the community aspect of the district is developed. For instance, two services I've heard that have had their funding cut are the CAB and Te Area Korowai - these are critical community services in the district, running on very little finance and a lot of voluntary/low paid support for their work. The loss of these, and like services, would strip out the "community" aspect of the area and leave many citizens the worse for it. The other area of development that is important to me is to create vibrant, aesthetic, community-friendly spaces. Such as developing business/shopping areas where people visit to shop, browse, go for lunch, mingle at street level. There are pockets of this kind of space, such as Maclean Street, Raumati Village but by and large I view Paraparaumu as an industrial estate with a bit of beach at the end of it. There's not a lot of beauty between the old SH1 and the beach.

Why Our Council Should Provide a Kerbside Recycling Programme With a Waste Minimisation Incentive

For those of us who have continued with the remnants of the KCDC provided kerbside recycling scheme the recent announcement by Envirowaste that they are withdrawing has been a bitter blow, but not unexpected. It demonstrates the abject failure of KCDC abandoning kerbside recycling to the private sector and the absolute imperative of KCDC restoring a council-provided kerbside recycling service, coupled with a waste collection service which has a waste minimisation incentive.

Now this experiment has come to an end, we should return to a ratepayer funded kerbside recycling service, coupled with a waste to landfill collection service with incentivises waste minimisation.

Background

After EnviroWaste recently announced at short notice they were discontinuing their service, KCDC issued a Q&A sheet.

The KCDC Q&A sheet does not tell the whole story. It says: "In 2012-13 after community consultation, council made the decision to exit from kerbside collection services – at the time there were three other contractors also providing the service across the district. The reason for this change was that the alternative providers could provide more cost-effective services, at a much lower rate than the council could match. The difference in price was because the council had to cover the costs of providing kerbside recycling to those ratepayers who use the recycling service weekly, but only use the rubbish bag infrequently."

The scheme to privatise our waste was implemented well before 2012, so any consultation in 2012/13 planning process was well after the horse had bolted.

In fact, KCDC effectively exited kerbside recycling and, perhaps more importantly, waste ministration, in the 2007-10 term after a privatisation proposal was sold to councillors by senior KCDC management. During the 2007-2010 term, KCDC adopted kerbside recycling. Previously waste for the landfill was collected weekly in bags and residents could use recycling centres at various locations.

When KCDC decided to adopt kerbside recycling. The free recycling facilities in local communities were closed and KCDC began providing a bag collection (for waste to landfill) and a kerbside recycling bin. The incentive to reduce waste was the cost of the bags.

Then KCDC senior management proposed that the system be handed over to private contractors. The theory (now completely disproved) was that the competition between commercial contractors would keep the bag price (the only cost) down.

There was no suggestion that residents would be required to put a minimum number of bags out to sustain the contractor's need to make a profit. On the contrary, there was a clear undertaking that a free kerbside recycling service would remain, and the implication was that the status quo of residents being able to reduce and minimise waste would continue.

Of course, the confidence KCDC management had in the market was ill-placed and the roots of the failure of the system occurred when KCDC exited providing the service as a ratepayer service.

That is because we now do not have a service which promotes waste minimisation and recycling. We have no service provided by our council and all the private services require a commitment to an annual fee for a waste to landfill container (wheelie bin) with recycling as the add-on.

In short, the current situation is:

- we have no participation or leadership from our council
- we have a fully privatised failed system
- we have no services which have waste minimisation incentives and zero incentives to recycle

The promise made when the privatisation occurred — that a free kerbside recycling service would remain — has been broken. This can fixed by restoring a free (rate-payer funded) kerbside recycling service.

Others can do it. Why not us?

In the Coromandel, there is a council kerbside recycling collection, even in far-flung areas on metal roads. Ratepayer-funded kerbside recycling/rubbish collections have continued in our neighbouring areas of Porirua, Wellington and Hutt City.

Kapiti is one of the councils participating in the *Wellington Region Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (2017-2023), which states:* "Councils have a statutory role in managing waste and are required to promote effective and efficient waste management and minimisation within their districts."

KCDC is failing to adequately or effectively promote waste minimisation in our district because the job has been left to commercial contractors who have not interest in this goal.

Kapiti prides itself on being and environmentally conscious district. How can this possibly be if we have no leadership from our council on waste minimisation and the whole issue has been handed over to private companies with not commitment to our district or waste minimisation?

Cost

Of course, restoring a ratepayer-funded system would mean a cost to all ratepayers, regardless of whether they use this service or not. There is also an environmental cost to ignoring council's responsibility to take leadership on waste minimisation.

KCDC's previous actions in exiting kerbside recycling and rubbish collection has left a gap which has been filled by a range of options that have no waste minimisation incentive, such as large wheelie bins with the same cost attached regardless of the amount of waste from households). Some households may choose to continue with the status quo. Our rates provide many such services that are not used by everyone in the community, such as sports facilities and libraries. This is certainly not a valid argument for not providing them. The purpose of rates is to pay for the services communities need, which are good for the community generally and reflect our goals, one of which is waste minimisation.

Solution sought

It is time for KCDC to return to the provision of a kerbside recycling service with a waste to landfill collection service which incentivises minimising that waste (as the bags have done).

The Q&A sheet states: "under the current system, instead of every household having to pay a set portion of rates for a set of rubbish and recycling service, each household can choose the service they would like to use, based on what providers are offering."

However, every household does not have a service they would like to use as there is no service which achieves the goals of encouraging waste minimisation and maximising recycling.

Waste management is a basic service and should be provided by council. Let's get it back.

The rationale for linking roading charges to rural property capital value is unconvincing for several reasons 1. there's no relationship between the two. Land value may be a sizable component of capital value, but land value is not an indicator of the use of roading or any other council services - its not acceptable to penalise those who have rural properties 2. the current roading services are poor or irrelevant. a. Mowing the verge is done so infrequently property owners (like me) need to do it - or graze it .b. Roadside markers are pointless - either they've been flattened by tractors or simply not needed. c. There is no street lighting other than a single light at the intersection of Mickell Rd and Hautere Cross - this is actually a very good thing as the last thing we need out here is a road looking like a Xmas tree. d. The road has little traffic, the surface is in good condition and resealing probably wont be needed for another 10 years - so the maintenance costs are small - surprisingly, relative to the number of landowners not the land value. 3. I think in all of this there's a cynicism in this proposal which is distasteful. Its easy to draw the conclusion that the council think rural property owners are in a position to cough up more for their rates. What is not often apparent is rural property owners have higher outgoings than urban properties (eg no water or sewerage) and have had to invest more heavily in their own infrastructure to ensure their own sustainablity. So if there is any thought that "they're rural so they can afford it" is simple malarkey. I support the introduction of a commercially targeted rate. However I oppose the reduction in the proportion of fixed rate charges for a number of reasons. -4 Councils in our region have fixed-rate charges 36% and below -5 Councils including ours have fixed-rate charges between 46 and 68%. What is the evidence that supports our goal of reducing this factor to 30% and what are the benefits of that? -I note the rationale that the current fixed charge roading proposal will support lower value house owners and the assumption they are lower income households, however roading is a facility used by all residents and in my view should be paid for through the fixed charge system as currently applies. Owners of higher value properties are already paying a premium in that my rate increase this year is 8.9% nearly double the average rate increase that you have stated as 4.7%. I have heard of others where the increase is 13% plus. This in a climate where the inflation rate for y/e March 2018 is estimated to be between 1.1 & 1.5% Additionally the % the 65+ population in the 2013 census was 25.3% with a further 6.5% aged 60-65. Based on these figures and the growth in this population between census years it is reasonable to assume the 65+ population could currently be around the 33-35% mark. Many of these people have higher value homes they have worked for over many years but are in receipt of fixed incomes. Your proposal will advantage one group but disadvantage another and in my view there is no compelling evidence to support such a shift. As I say we are already paying a premium. Because we have no mechanism to practically charge road users which would be the fairest method I believe strongly we must stay with the status quo.

Introduction

Kapiti Coast District communities:

- Have NZ's second-largest percentage of residents aged 65-and over, and will share the national expectation of sector growth of 35% during the next 15 years.
- Have older age groups that experience increasing rates of impairments, many of which hamper accessibility and inclusion.
- Enjoy cultural and ethnic diversity.
- Provide a wide range of activities and health and social support networks.

Guidelines

1. New Zealand is a signatory to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, which guides territorial authorities on how to remove barriers and ensure disabled people have "full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms".

2. A disabled person is one with a physical, intellectual, sensory and age-related or mental impairment who faces social or physical environmental barriers to participating and contributing to community life.

3. Inclusion means the right of all people to live in an inclusive community where they are able to participate, learn and work.

Strategic Objectives

S1. An inclusive Kapiti Coast where residents and visitors are able to be involved in decisions that may affect them.

S2. To assist Council, Health and Government agencies to communicate and interact with groups, including people with disabilities, health problems and age-related impairments.

S3. To resolve health and disability issues that arise through Kapiti's distance from accident, medical and

outpatient clinics based in Wellington and Kenepuru hospitals.

S4. To recognise the importance of accessible journeys, which means providing accessible components of travel by train and bus, and provision of safe and accessible routes between carparks, buildings and recreation areas.

S5. To implement the recommendations and requirements of NZ Standard 4121, which underpins the Building Act and provides the means of compliance with the Building Code.

S6. To advise health and local government agencies on best practice to ensure people who identify as disabled or impaired live in a safe, secure and healthy environment.

S7. To help home builders and businesses adopt the benefits of lifetime design, universal access and exceeding the minimum accessibility requirements. Examples:

* Retention of value in accessible homes.

* Improving retail trade via accessible entry and layout.

* Providing accessible toilets in larger retail outlets.

S8. To embed accessibility factors in Council planning, project development and resource consenting processes.

S9. To recommend that venues provided by sports clubs and other organisations for hire for meetings, hospitality and entertainment comply with the accessibility provisions of NZ Standard 4121.

S10. To maintain communication and engagement with tangata whenua, their whanau, hapu and iwi, and other relevant community groups, about Council service delivery, planning and policy impacts.

It is difficult to fully understand the proposal since in your advice to ratepayers you have only provided the impact of your proposed system. We can only suppose that if the status quo were retained, the rates increase would be 4.7% as this is the average increase indicated. In our case the increase is 7.8% simply because of the QV arbitrary computer generated valuation. KCDC also notes that increased property values do not increase the total rates collected - why them penalise some ratepayers more than others? I am prepared to tolerate my share of the 4.7% increase but you MUST NOT assume that a higher property valuation is supported by higher incomes. We are a retired couple with fixed means provided mainly by Govt Super and the higher valuations also bring with them higher insurances etc. Endless cost increases are simply not sustainable, especially when thay are disproportionate to levels of consumption of services. Is it possible to provide a comparison of what the 2018/2019 rating increase would be under the existing system. To increase the roading charges based on capital value of the family home is a very crude and unfair rating system.
