

Private Harry Moller, 20689 [8th Māori reinforcements], wounded Passchedaele.


25 DECEMBER

The total strength of the Battalion in the field at the end of 1917 is 928, consisting of 29 officers and 899 other ranks. A Company numbered 196, B Company 203, C Company 182, and D Company 236; transport 66. In addition there were are 50 men at Etaples ready to come forward, a further contingent at Sling Camp, and 15 N.C.O.'s at the O.T.C. (Officer Training Corps).

The 27th Reinforcements NZ Pioneer (Māori) Battalion sail from New Zealand on board HMNZT101 Tofua. Onboard was Sergeant Hari Wi KATENE, 19927, Ngāti Toa Rangatira.

By this time 2740 men had departed from Narrow Neck Camp including Māori, Pacific Islanders and some from tunnelling reinforcements.

18 MARCH

Pte James HARMON, 19680 [17th Māori Reinforcements] died of wounds.

21 MARCH

News came through of the German offensive in the Cambrai area.

22 MARCH

Battalion moves to a camp near Ouderdom after three months in Ypres.

26 MARCH

Battalion arrives at Amiens, Somme. After a meal the men left by motor lorry for Pont Noyelles, thence on foot to Hedauville, where they spend a very cold night.

27 MARCH

Battalion move from Hedauville to Bertrancourt and then to Sailly au Bois.

29 MARCH

The 26th Reinforcements NZ Pioneer (Māori) Battalion arrive Liverpool on board HMNZT100 Ulimaro.


In New Zealand the first of three ballots under the Military Service Act are held. In the three ballots up to 17 August 1918 479 names are drawn but only 136 are deemed fit.

The New Zealand Division is relieved by the British 42nd Division, and the Northumberland Fusiliers (Pioneers) take over the Māori work and camp. The NZ Battalion then takes over the camp at Coigneux, vacated by the relief. A good deal of work is done here when orders are received to shift to a camping area nearer Souastre.

13 JUNE

in the beginning...

our connection to the land some say, began with the stars and the heavens. Matariki has been and still is, a time to remember the past and a time to restore faith and hope for the future.

Traditional Māori lore tells of creation from lo Matua Te Kore (lo parent of the nothingness) to Te Ao Marama (the world of light).

Matariki is deeply embedded in Māori culture, acknowledged and revived through art, song, proverbs, stories and genealogy.

Like other peoples around the world, Mäori looked to the heavens and noted the travel pattern of the stars and knew their rising and setting meant seasonal change.

The appearance of Matariki determined how to prepare the land. If Matariki appeared clear and bright, the weather would be warm and the harvest plentiful. If blurred and hazy, the weather would be cold and the harvest poor.


"Ngā kai a Matariki, nāna i ao ake ki runga"

Matariki scoops up the food, signifying the neccessity of planning and preserving food for the winter.

This whakatauki (proverbial saying) reminds us that the work should be completed by the time Matariki rises in late May or June.

WHIRO	the moon enters a new phase
TIREA	reasonably good night for crayfishing, eeling and planting
НОАТА	very good day for eeling, crayfishing, planting kumara and sowing any seed
ŌUE	a good day for establishing tuber beds, planting food and fishing
ŌKORO	another good day for planting food, fish are restless
TAMATEA-KAI-ARIKI	a day for planting food, west winds prevail that only rain will quell
TAMATEA-Ā-NGANA	eels are voracious feeders this night, a good day for planting food and fishing but beware of fog and foaming sea
TAMATEA ĀIĀ	eel, fish and kumara are abundant but small, a productive day for collecting shellfish, fishermen beware!
TAMATEA-WHAKAPAUA	favourable day for planting from morning to midday, not very good for fishing
ARIROA	a disagreeable day, one for marking time
HUNA	do not plant food. not a good day for fishing, eel and crayfish are wary
MĀWHARU	a most favourable day for planting food. kumara are large, but rot quickly, a good day for fishing, a good night for trapping crayfish and eel
ŌHUA	a very good day for planting food
ATUA WHAKAHAEHAE	not a good day for planting food or fishing
ŌTURU	a good day for bobbing eel, a good day for fishing and for planting food from midday to sundown

RĀKAUNUI	a very good day, crops are bountiful, a good day for fishing but not eeling
RĀKAUMATOHI	a very good day for fishing but not eeling, seed plants grow vigorously
TAKIRAU (FAINTLY VISIBLE)	the moon is hazy, food is bountiful but small in size
OIKE	not a good day for fishing or planting food
KOREKORE TE WHIAWHIA	an unproductive night on the shore winds sweep the seas
KOREKORE TE RAWEA	not a fruitful night, food is scarce but await the turn of the tide
KOREKORE PIRI KI TANGAROA	a good day from midday to sundown a productive period for taking eel, trapped or otherwise most foods are plentiful
TANGAROA-À-MUA	a good day for planting food, for fishing and eeling
TANGAROA-Ā-ROTO	productive days for fishing and for planting food
TANGAROA-WHAKAPAU	a good day for fishing and the cultivation of seed beds
TANGAROA-Ā-KIOKIO	a good day for taking eel, for fishing and setting crayfish and eel traps
ŌTĀNE	a good day for fishing, eeling and crayfishing, a reasonably good day for planting food
ŌRONGONUI	a very productive day for planting food, fishing and eeling
MAURI	not a productive day, food is scarce, fish are restless and turn tail
MUTUWHENUA	unproductive day and night the moon has diminished and the world is now in total darkness


