Maclean park has a long history in Skateboarding and was at one time one of the premier skate destinations in NZ, attracting professional demonstrations from big names such as Tony Hawk. Now it's pathetic. One of the original three drafts proposed had the building of a skate bowl. It was dissapointing that only one draft included this option, because that meant that people who liked other features in the other plans would vote for them, inadvertently 'voting against' the bowl, without really intending too. The bowl only had a 33% chance of getting built. We

need a modern style, vertical skate bowl in Kapiti! The nearest one is 45 minutes drive away at Waitangi Park in Wellington. Have a look at this video for the type of calibre of athletes the bowl in Bondi, Sydney attracts. These are some of the best skateboarders in the world and this is an amazing event. a. What are your major concerns?

The provision of adequate recreational boating facilities does not appear to have been included in the plan. A big part of the appeal of living on the 'coast' is access to the fantastic boating that's on offer here. Unfortunately due to the nature of our coastline boat launching has to be done directly off the beach and usually requires the use of a tractor. This need for a tractor for launching and retrieving boats has been met by the kapiti boat club which house and maintain two tractors on site for use by members for this purpose. Without these tractors being available on site for use by club members

many members of the local boating community would not be able to launch their boats here safely. So provision of tractor storage facilities and a public boat wash down area must be included in the plan. There are safety issues associated with the tractor operations which are compounded by the limited car parking available at the boat club and by the presence of two large commercial ferry operators and their customers who are taking up the club car parks at present an for whom adequate parking should be provided in an area south of the stream to provide some separation between the commercial and recreational boating activities. The KCDC documents state that you've consulted with the kapiti boating club about this pan but i can say as a long standing boat club member that members have not been engaged by the club committee regarding this plan and as far as Im aware nor have the kapiti dive club or coastquard who both also occupy space in the existing club rooms site. It is my view based on many years experience using the boat club and beach access for recreational boating activities that the commercial ferry operations should be separated from the recreational boat ,coastquard and dive club activities and that any gateway/bio-security area should be developed as a separate site and preferably located on the southern side of the stream. The approach to this plans development has been misguided in my view and it is a mistake to include the development of the play areas at the middle and southern sections of mclean park with the development of the boat club precinct to the north of the stream. It is preferable to keep the the boating activities and associated vehicle traffic separate from the children's/play area parts of the park so as to ensure no one gets run over by the tractor and associated boat launching activities.

b. What would need to change to address these concerns?

1) Relocate the gateway/bio-security hub to the south side of the stream. 2) Retain the existing boat club site for non commercial/recreational boating activities only as per its current status 3) Create a recreational boating precinct at the northern end of the park/where the boat club site is at present and provide public boat wash down facilities, rubbish bins etc within this recreational boating precinct 4) Discourage foot traffic from the southern sections of the park from entering this northern recreational boating precinct by limiting the walkway to the areas south of the stream to ensure the safety of pedestrians and to provide a safe operating area for the many recreational boaties that use the northern area of the park to access the beach for boat launching with the associated tractor operations that present a risk to the general public if they are milling around this area which is what is happening at present 5) Provide adequate parking and loading zones for the commercial ferry operators and their customers in an area directly south of the stream 6) Provide public toilets within the northern recreational boating precinct

c. What, if anything, do you like about the plan?

1)The restoration of the tikotu stream is a fantastic idea :-) 2)Removing the duck pond and watch house - these are both past their use by date and these areas of the park could be put to better use

d. Any other comments (optional).

There is very little mention in the plan of the cultural, customary, recreational and economic benefits that the recreational boating activity that occurs at the northern end of the park brings to our district. Boating is a huge part of the kapiti coast lifestyle and the northern section of mclean park has historically been the center of this community and activity and its purpose and designation as a hub for recreational boating activity should be retained in the plan. The commercial ferry operators have been increasingly encroaching on this space over the past 10 years and while they also need to be catered for it should be remembered that they are commercial operators who are making private profits from their activities which they are relying on the use of public facilities to generate. The recreational boating community should not have their facilities sacrificed in order to provide an area for these commercial operators to conduct their business.





a. What are your major concerns?

Inadequacy of information available to respondents about options for the park, particularly background as to why some present facilities are in the condition they are. As an example. Pond leakage - the only information about the pond leakage from KCDC is that the average amount of water required to keep the pond at 33 cm depth (0.33 m) is 108 cu m per day (news 23 September 2016). This is almost a quarter of the total volume of the pond – about 7 cm depth change in a day. It is important to see these data documented in detail. No other information has been forthcoming from Council staff. It has been

impossible so far to get any real information about the leaks, testing for leaks and details of the new (2013) pond construction from staff. When filling by KCDC staff ceased, leakage dropped to a maximum of 13 cu m per day (less than 1 cm). The pond has not been dry through the summer. In late July 2017 the water level stood at 19 cm (gauge on bridge pillar). The high leakage noted by KCDC staff indicates leak at about the 33 cm water depth level - was this investigated by KCDC staff? The draft management plan notes a major re-lining of the pond in 2013. This comprised a plastic liner overlain by rock revetment and fill (draft Maclean Park management plan). Since that time, the major leaks have occurred. So it appears the liner was damaged at a height of 33 cm, either during installation or by the rocks edging, which are large and angular, one or more of which has apparently penetrated the liner. The subsequent attempt to seal with asphalt were unfortunate. Leaks remained, as it would be expected as it is difficult to seal the very irregular rock surface. IT IS IRONIC that Avalon Park is quote as an example for how a park should be - they have a large pond with no leaks and high varied use. The consultation appears to have the elimination of the pond as a given - it was not set up as an option in the initial consultation. The pond has been half empty for a year and apparently not maintained, so obviously is not as attractive and useful as it could be. Management Plan consultation process Earlier this year there was strong support for keeping the pond. However it has not been considered as an option in the management plan review process. Why? Are KCDC staff pre-judging some options for the plan, if so this casts some doubt about the community consultation. From memory, the initial on-line questionnaire did not include any place for expressing support for the retention of the pond (and incidentally many of the questions in the survey appear to be either leading or closed questions). In the three initial draft options, an option for retention of the pond was not included. Had it already been decided that there will be no pond? This casts doubt about the rest of the consultation, as although the consultation has been wide, it appears that by selective omission, parts of the draft plan could well be largely pre-judged. If the public want the retention of the pond, and they should be given the opportunity to say so, then this should be identified and indicative costs presented. If not, then the pond can go. It should not be a decision of KCDC staff or the Consultant. If the retention option is supported, the cost for bringing the pond up to an adequate standard needs to be assessed for feasibility. In the last draft of a management plan, additional comment is made that the water quality in the pond does not meet appropriate standards. Again, a comment that needs qualification as the pond has been allowed to stagnate for the past year, and its neglect means that the water quality now is suspect. This is now used by the Consultant and/or the KCDC staff running the consultation as a reason in the second draft Plan/Options to exclude the pond as a viable option. A second example would be the Kiosk. Its been left empty (and locked up last weekend when it was sunny), so no-one goes there, hence no support. Perhaps if there was a coffee shop there it would have been very popular for parents watching children play or just for social meetings. A commercial operation may not be favoured but a public cafe/bar appears to be operating in the Boat Club. The Kiosk could also make a suitable place for a Kapiti Interpretative Centre to be placed as it has fine views of the island, and this would lower the potential tourist pressure on Area A. Again is this Kiosk not favoured by KCDC staff? The devil is in the detail - this applies particularly to the buildings (clubs and visitor facilities/biosecurity) in Area A at the northern end of the Park - its is not clear how big are the proposed buildings and how many? How many signs? The whole area could have little to no view across it to the sea and Kapiti Island. Only about 25% of the foreshore from QE2 Park to north Waikanae is open to the general public, the rest is tied up in private residential sections, so we should minimise urbanisation of the remaining 25%. Should there be an increase in parking when we are trying to reduce greenhouse gas emissions? No consideration of future sea level change or coastal erosion. The two reports by the consultant(s) are long, difficult to follow with imprecise or ill defined concepts and poorly labelled or explained bar graphs and Tables. Probable loss of mature trees where the elderly playgound appears to be planned What is the role of the Manly Street paper road and the small coastal section between it and the defined Maclean Park? Lack of information from KCDC staff when requested.

b. What would need to change to address these concerns?

Problem is that now the consultation is at its latest stages. Decisions appear to have already been made. As a minimum, the Consultant's reports should be revised. The results of the consultations, on-line surveys and other submissions should be clearly explained to the public. Hopefully future consultations will be more open. Keep any development of buildings in Area A within the Boat/Underwater clubs footprint. Reduce area of elderly playground.

c. What, if anything, do you like about the plan?

Restoration of the stream estuary and moving beach access to north of Boat Club. Continuity of walkway through whole park - but am concerned about shared nature if not wide enough. Area C northern end (pedestrian friendly area) looks a good solution Otherwise, the existing set-up (not the proposed) after suitable maintenance is fine.

Half basketball court would fit in where it is if turned by 90 degrees and fitted with a high fence on street side. Scooter track presumably for younger children may fit better closer to playground

- 1. Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai Charitable Trust (**TAKW**) represents the mana whenua of the area from Kūkū-Tauākī to the Whareroa, with an overlapping interest with Ngāti Toarangatira in the area from Whareroa to Paripari pā. Kāpiti Coast District Council (**KCDC**) recognises TAKW as mana whenua through their Memorandum of Partnership with the iwi.
- 2. This submission is made as mana whenua in the spirit of partnership with KCDC and in the interest of ensuring positive outcomes for mana whenua, Council and the wider community.
- 3. TAKW have also already provided a significant amount of information on the high value of the Maclean Park area to the history and culture of Te Ātiawa ki Whakarongotai, which has informed the development of the Plan Refresh to date.
- 4. TAKW recognises that Maclean Park is part of land and resources that come under the claims that are currently due to be heard by the Waitangi Tribunal in the WAI 2200 Inquiry.
- 5. TAKW also recognises the historical value of Te Uruhi pā and Tikotu Stream to Ngāti Toarangatira, and the wider interests of Ngāti Raukawa in Raukawa Moana and the area that Maclean Park serves, including a number of 'Island Whānau' who live offshore, or regularly travel offshore. TAKW see their role in the Refresh as being fundamental as the mana whenua, who are responsible for upholding the role of kaitiaki, including the consideration of the wider interests of other iwi groups in the area.
- 6. TAKW supports a collaborative approach to the development of the Park which is inclusive of KCDC, the Department of Conservation, Paraparaumu Community Board, the Chamber of Commerce, Paraparaumu Beach Business Association and the wider public.
- 7. However, the Plan must be consistent with the kaupapa (values) and tikanga (practices) of mana whenua. TAKW provides **Appendix A** attached to this submission: an outline of the kaupapa and tikanga that TAKW has articulated they wish to be upheld through the Plan.
- 8. TAKW believe that the Park provides a great opportunity for the development of a world class facility that provides for the interpretation and promotion of a range of cultural, natural and conservation values that are unique to the area. In particular, TAKW supports

- the idea of a 'Gateway' building at or close to the site of the Kāpiti Boat Club to promote and support those values.
- 9. TAKW encourages KCDC to provide a plan that will demonstrate genuine strategic vision for the area, with a particular emphasis on the contribution that promoting tourism though the Park can make to the District as a whole. TAKW believes that investment in the Park will provide large flow-on benefits for the wider community.
- 10. TAKW wish to have the opportunity to speak to this submission.

APPENDIX A: TE ĀTIAWA KI WHAKARONGOTAI VALUES AND MACLEAN PARK

Introduction

1. Maclean Park is part of a larger Te Āti Awa settlement area that includes Te Uruhi Pā, the Tikotu Stream and the Paraparaumu Coastal Marine Area, areas of high significance to Te Āti Awa. Te Uruhi Pā is a significant pā site for Te Āti Awa and provided protection to the tūpuna of Te Āti Awa during precarious times. The Tikotu is a significant waterbody for Te Āti Awa, holding values such as mahinga kai, pā and wai Māori. The Paraparaumu Coastal Marine Area is significant to Te Āti Awa for values such as wai tai, mahinga kai, and tauranga waka.

Mauri

- Mauri is described by Barlow as:¹
 - ...a special power possessed by lo which makes it possible for everything to move and live in accordance with the conditions and limits of its existence. Everything has a mauri, including people, fish, animals, birds, forests, lands, seas, and rivers.
- 3. Mauri is defined by the people of Te Āti Awa as the essential life force or energy that drives a whole ecological system including a river catchment or coastal marine area such as the Tikotu and Paraparaumu CMA. The mauri of these areas can be seen through the health and quality of both their components and the functionality of the whole system.

You know it's not only about the kai (food) in the river, it's all about when you get down there, how you feel; kei te rere pai te awa, nē (Does the river flow well)? Is it clean? Where are all the birds? I think if the birds are not there, there's no food there. The river's unhealthy. Kua mate te mauri o te awa.

Tikotu Stream

4. The Tikotu Stream, and particularly the river mouth, is a waterbody of high significance to Te Āti Awa. The Tikotu River has sustained the people of Te Āti Awa

since our migration to the Kāpiti region. The Tikotu is a significant mahinga kai site, particularly for tuna. As discussed above, the Tikotu traditionally served Te Uruhi Pā which was located on its southern bank as a mahinga kai but also as a source of freshwater.

- 5. The Tikotu carries the significant values of mahinga kai, pā and wai Māori and any access to the river mouth should be ensure the protection of these values as well as the life supporting capacity of the habitat within the Tikotu.
- 6. The health of the Tikotu and the ecological systems within have been significantly adversely effected by previous development, including being diverted to provide for roading.²
- 7. The Tikotu has issues with toxicity and has been recorded as containing heavy metals reflecting poor water quality and mauri. Shellfish have been tested as unsafe to eat. Historically, wetlands would have been used to filter contaminants entering the Tikotu, however, these have been drained and no longer work as a filter for contaminants.
- 8. The Paraparaumu CMA is also a significant mahinga kaimoana site for Te Āti Awa. As such, any work that is undertaken in the Paraparaumu CMA should protect the life supporting capacity of the CMA and its habitat.
- 9. The Paraparaumu CMA holds the following significant values for Te Āti Awa:
 - a. wai tai;
 - b. mahinga kai;
 - c. tauranga waka; and
 - d. kai moana.
- 10. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi (youth) have commented that the mauri of the water in the Te Uruhi area needs to be of higher quality and this will be a priority for Te Āti Awa in these discussions. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi have also commented that the Tikotu needs restoration to restore the abundance of habitat and species within the Tikotu.
- 11. Healthy mauri in waterbodies is present where there is an abundance of species within and around the waterbodies. Both the Tikotu and the Paraparaumu CMA are important mahinga kai for Te Āti Awa. Mahinga kai sustains the people of Te Āti Awa and also provides Te Āti Awa with kai for important events such as tangihanga and hui-ā-iwi. The presence of the following species will indicate that the mauri of the Tikotu and Paraparaumu CMA are healthy:
 - a. Tuna, short and long fin eel;
 - b. Inanga;
 - c. Shellfish
- 12. The Te Āti Awa Rangatahi note that the mauri of the environment directly effects the health of people. Therefore, it is critical that the Te Uruhi area and the surrounding

environment is restored and upheld including through the utilisation of methods that Te Āti Awa considers appropriate.

- 13. The following hua (outcomes) are an indication that the value of mauri is being upheld in the Te Uruhi / Maclean Park area:
 - a. Good water quality including low turbidity and appropriate oxygen and nutrient levels.
 - b. An abundance and diversity of healthy mahinga kai species within the waterbodies.
 - c. A commitment to exploring various methods for the healthy management of the waterbodies.
 - d. Appropriate dune and riparian vegetation

Te Ao Tūroa

- 14. Te Ao Tūroa describes the natural order of the universe which brings balance to the world. Examples of the natural order of the universe include phenomena such as the migration of fish and bird species, the movement of the sun across the horizon and the changing of the phase of the moon.
- 15. Historically, the Kāpiti Coast was dominated by wetlands which were interconnected with waterbodies. Rather than attempting to dominate this environment, the mana whenua adapting their lifestyle to suit the environment. However, as development has increased wetlands have been drained and streams have been diverted and modified to suit development. This is true of the Tikotu and Te Uruhi area and this type of development reflects a disconnect with the value Te Ao Tūroa.
- 16. Another aspect of Te Ao Tūroa is the element of predictability Te Ao Tūroa brings to our surrounding environment. Over the generations the people of Te Āti Awa have observed the natural rhythms and patterns of the environment and rely on their predictability to inform the practice of their kaitiakitanga and decision-making. Kaitiaki rely on tohu or environmental indicators to guide their decision-making and resource use.
- 17. With respect to mahinga kai, the appropriate balance of certain habitats and ecological niches and the seasonality of the mahinga kai system, are important to ensure the availability of a diverse range of traditional food throughout the year. Therefore, the management of the catchment must avoid disrupting the natural order or stability of the river system. In this respect, Te Āti Awa notes that the Tikotu is a potential spawning site for inanga and must be managed to protect those spawning sites.
- 18. Appropriate native vegetation also contributes to healthy ecosystems and ensures natural processes continue to occur, in particular inanga spawning. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi commented that the vegetation in and around Maclean Park needs to be native and healthy.
- 19. The following hua (outcomes) indicate that the value of Te Ao Tūroa is being upheld in this context is:

- a. Waterbodies are able to follow their natural course rather than be managed to suit development.
- b. The interconnectedness of waterways is supported.
- c. Native fish species' spawning sites are available at the appropriate seasonal time and are being utilised.
- d. Appropriate riparian planting exists along the Tikotu Stream and appropriate planting is present throughout Maclean Park and along the Coast. Such planting should support species indigenous to the rohe.

Māramatanga

- 20. The people of Te Āti Awa describe māramatanga as collective cultural memory and knowledge, that is inherited by each generation from our tūpuna who have gone before us. The māramatanga is then built on by each generation and provides us with important insight into the function and health of the environment.
- 21. Where an aspect of the environment is eroded, or destroyed, māramatanga pertaining to that aspect of the environment may be lost thereby preventing the intergenerational transmission of that māramatanga. This is true for streams like the Tikotu, where many practices are now lost to Te Āti Awa due to our lack of involvement in the management of streams. The retention and practice of our māramatanga of is critical to our ability to practice kaitiakitanga to ensure the mauri and health of our environment, including the Tikotu.
- 22. The original management plan was created with limited mana whenua input. This omission missed an important opportunity to include knowledge and māramatanga held by Te Āti Awa on this area including the ecology of the area, and important historical information about the settlement of the area. The Management Plan needs to ensure meaningful input by Te Āti Awa to ensure our māramatanga in relation to Te Uruhi and Maclean Park contributes to the future development of Te Āti Awa.
- 23. The following hua (outcomes) indicate that māramatanga is being upheld:
 - a. Knowledge, understanding and insight of the Tikotu catchment is able to develop and improve based on input into the management of the Tikotu.
 - b. Te Āti Awa knowledge and histories are considered a necessary inclusion in the Management Plan and future development of Maclean Park.

Mana

- 24. The people of Te Āti Awa describe mana as the security and authority that whānau and hapū hold as a result of their status as mana whenua and their Treaty right to tino rangatiratanga of taonga. This mana is the basis for the practice of kaitiakitanga and the role of mana whenua in decision making for the rohe.
- 25. The development of Maclean Park presents a pertinent opportunity for the community to acknowledge the mana of Te Āti Awa through collaboration of KCDC with Te Āti Awa and the community. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi considers that it

important to work in a collaborative, pro-active manner with the community, indeed, such a working relationship is mana enhancing for all parties involved.

- 26. Mana is further reflected in a community with social cohesion (kotahitanga) and community strength (whanaungatanga). Therefore, any collaboration with Te Āti Awa should ensure that engagement processes promote kotahitanga, whanauangatanga and the mana of Te Āti Awa as a whole.
- 27. Mana is also reflected in manaakitanga and the ability of Te Āti Awa to provide good experiences to visitors through enjoyment of shared spaces, including through enjoyment of traditional foods. Barlow describes manaaki as follows:³

Manaaki is derived from the power of the word as in mana-a-kī, and means to express love and hospitality towards people.

- 28. The following hua (outcomes) indicate that the value of mana is being upheld:
 - a. Te Āti Awa are recognised as mana whenua and are guaranteed decision-making input into the development of the Management Plan and future development plans.
 - b. The Maclean Project supports collaboration and positive relationships between Te Āti Awa, KCDC and the wider community.
 - c. Support is provided to Te Āti Awa to engage in a collaborative way that supports the kotahitanga, whanaungatanga, and mana of the iwi.
 - d. Te Āti Awa is guaranteed input into decision-making that affects the Tikotu and Paraparaumu CMA.
- 29. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi also suggested specific hua that would uphold the value of mana
 - a. Change of the name of the park to Te Uruhi
 - b. Bilingual signage
 - c. Facilities to enjoy food including BBQ facilities sheltered eating stations
 - d. Facilities that enable sharing of experience such as free wi-fi

Wairua

- 30. Wairua is the spiritual health, peace and safety of living things. Wairua are the intangible qualities of the natural environment and people that must be treated with respect. There is a wairua connected to the people, the whenua, and waterbodies.
- 31. With respect to the Tikotu, water is regarded as having the special function of being able to transfer character or quality. For example, pure good quality water is used to perform spiritual rites such as baptisms or blessings, and for healing both physical and mental illnesses. Conversely, water that is of poor quality has not just physical effects but intangible emotional and spiritual effects on people.
- 32. In addition to the wairua of the person, certain places within Te Uruhi and Maclean Park, including Te Uruhi Pā, have a history and a connection to our tūpuna which gives them a certain wairua and tapu that should be respected.

- 33. Recreational spaces are also important in supporting the health of the wairua of people and communities, in that they are well-balanced and at peace.
- 34. The following hua (outcomes) indicate that the value of wairua is being upheld:
 - a. The wairua of the people is supported through their interaction with and access to the clean, healthy water in the Tikotu and along the coast.
 - b. Maclean Park provides spaces where the wairua of Te Uruhi as a pā site and settlement area for Te Āti Awa is respected.
- 35. Te Āti Awa Rangatahi also suggested the following specific hua that would uphold the value of wairua:
 - a. Aspects of the design that utilise water in a positive way, e.g. water features or a splash pad
 - b. Good facilities for recreation such as bike paths or for sports and games, e.g a chess pad.

Whakapapa

36. Whakapapa is described as:4

...the genealogical descent of all living things from the gods to the present time. The meaning of whakapapa is 'to lay one thing upon another' as, for example, to lay one generation upon another. Everything has a whakapapa: birds, fish, animals, trees, and every other living thing; soil and rocks and mountains also have a whakapapa.

37. In a broader sense, whakapapa is the network of the genealogical and ecological connections found in the natural world. It is from understanding all these connections and where one is positioned within the network, that gives people a sense of their identity and place in the world.

Te Tomokanga o te Awa Pikopiko o Te Āti Awa me Ngāti Toa / The Entranceway to the Stream that Winds together Te Āti Awa and Ngāti Toa

38. The Paraparaumu Coastal Marine Area (**CMA**) is culturally significant as a site both historically and currently for the launching of waka and as an entrance point for iwi traveling from Taranaki and Waikato and over to Kāpiti Island. At the Battle of Te Kuititanga in 1839 (discussed below), crew from the settler ship *Tory* made first landfall at the Paraparaumu CMA near Te Uruhi Pā to attend to the wounded.

Te Uruhi Pā

39. Te Uruhi was a significant Te Āti Awa settlement on the Kāpiti Coast. From 1822, groups from Taranaki and Waikato began to settle in the area. One of those groups was Ngāti Toa, and interactions between Ngāti Toa and Muaūpoko were initially peaceful. However, after a failed assassination by Muaūpoko on Te Rauparaha, war broke out between Ngāti Toa and Muaūpoko, with Ngāti Toa the victor.

- 40. Following the battle between Muaūpoko and Ngāti Toa, Te Rangihaeata, of Ngāti Toa and his followers settled at Te Uruhi. Ngāti Toa's stay only lasted a few months before they moved to Kāpiti Island, which was considered safer.⁵
- 41. A well-known korero relating to Te Uruhi is that pertaining to the famous high chief, Kahe te Rauoterangi. Kahe te Rauoterangi, also known as Kahe was the daughter of Te Matoha, a Ngāti Toa chief who, because of his close ties with Te Āti Awa, spent a lot of time living at Waikanae. Kahe was held in high esteem as a direct descendant of Te Rauparaha⁶ and one of three women to sign the Treaty of Waitangi.
- 42. Kahe is renowned for swimming from Kāpiti to the mainland with her small child strapped to her back to warn of an impending attack. Kahe was at Wai-o-Rua on Kāpiti Island when she saw a war party from Muaūpoko, Ngāti Apa and Rangitāne heading towards Wai-o-Rua. The warriors and rangatira of the iwi were at Te Uruhi Pā and only women and children remained at Kāpiti. To warn the rangatira of the impending attack (and seek assistance), Kahe strapped her baby to her back and crossed the channel between Kāpiti and the mainland to warn of the attack. Because of Kahe's remarkable feat, the channel between Kāpiti and the mainland was named in commemoration of her and is shown onsome maps as Rauoterangi Channel.⁷
- 43. Following the battle at Wai-o-Rua, those of Ngāti Toa's allies, including Te Āti Awa migrated to the Kāpiti area as part of the Niho Puta heke. A large contingent of the Puketapu hapū of Te Āti Awa also arrived as part of the Whirinui heke. Land was allocated at Te Uruhi to the Puketapu hapū in the aftermath of a battle at Pukerangiora in 1833. In the early 1830's the Puketapu hapū of Te Āti Awa built a pā on a large sand dune at Te Uruhi, known as the Te Uruhi Pā. The pā was protected by swamp on three sides and a trench was dug to defend the northern side. The artificial pond that is currently located at Maclean Park is located where this trench once was. Te Āti Awa traded flax, kai and other items with whalers and early Pākeha traders.
- 44. Te Uruhi Pā played a large role in the aftermath of the most significant battle for Te Āti Awa, the Battle of Kuititanga in 1839 fought between Te Āti Awa and Ngāti Raukawa. Following Ngāti Raukawa's defeat, prisoners were taken to both Kenakena Pā and Te Uruhi Pā and were put to death by the Puketapu chief, Te Manutoheroa. The settler ship, *Tory*, arrived at Kāpiti in 1839 on the same day the battle of Te Kuititanga was fought and their first landfall was Te Uruhi. Some of the crew crossed over to attend the wounded. The settler ship in the settler ship is the settler ship in the settler ship.
- 45. The work of the Native Land Court saw Te Uruhi divided up into various land blocks. The Puketapu hapū were awarded Ngarara West B Block consisting of 1584 acres. Land alienations resulted from the division of Te Uruhi and by 1850s Te Uruhi had

been almost deserted. Many residents had returned to Waitara and some had reportedly died within the previous few years.¹³

- 46. Maclean Park is named after two Scottish emigrants who acquired the area in the early 1900's. Maclean Park was sold by the Maclean's and later became a recreation reserve.
- 47. Te Uruhi has rich history full of whakapapa connections that should be respected and upheld during the Maclean Park refresh. Such connections include that Te Uruhi is a space where tupuna and rangatira lived; a settlement area for Te Āti Awa; a tauranga waka; and the entry point for iwi traveling from Taranaki and Waikato and to Kāpiti Island. The connection of Te Uruhi to Kāpiti Island is particularly significant to Te Āti Awa both historically and presently. Te Āti Awa notes that koiwi have been found in the Te Uruhi area in the past, reflecting this historical context of and tapu of the Te Uruhi area to Te Āti Awa.
- 48. The Maclean Park Project presents a pertinent opportunity to provide Te Āti Awa and the community with special spaces, sites and activities where whakapapa connections to ancestors each other, and the environment are felt, experienced, and enacted.
- 49. The following hua (outcomes) will ensure the whakapapa of Te Uruhi / Maclean Park will be respected and upheld:
 - a. The historical context of the Te Uruhi area to Te Āti Awa, including the connection to Kāpiti Island, is recognised and given effect to throughout the Management Plan and development process.
 - b. The people of Te Āti Awa and the wider community are able to enjoy Te Uruhi through experiencing whakapapa connections to ancestors, each other and the environment.
- Te Āti Awa Rangatahi also suggested the following specific hua that would uphold the value of whakapapa:
 - a. Stories about the pā, the history of Te Āti Awa and significant events displayed through monuments, sculpture, Māori artworks, mural, images. Perhaps through a walkway with visual interpretation along the way.

It is clear from our earlier stages of consultation that people want Maclean Park to be "a destination for all; a place to meet, play, relax and connect with Kāpiti Island, our heritage and environment. We have prepared a plan for the management and development of the park that reflects the following design principles:

Formal recognition of the need for a vision and long term plan for the broader development of the recreational facilities contained within the area known as Maclean Park. Retaining the area as a Recreational Reserve supporting the current and likely future needs of the broader community and

existing stakeholders, both safely and in sympathy with the special attributes of the area, is core to the success of the plan and helping define Kapiti as an area that has a true point of difference fir both residents and visitors to the area.

b. Why do you want changes made?

It is an unacceptable oversight that the draft plan does not make any tangible reference to the Kapiti Underwater Club, the 50 year history and presence of their club rooms on Maclean Park, the creation in the 1980/90's of the Kapiti Marine Reserve, the importance of the proximity of Maclean Park to the only sheltered beach on the Kapiti Coast to safely launch and retrieve boats used by recreational divers and fishermen. There is also no mention of any intent by the Council Planners to protect the \$300,000 in building assets that have been invested in by the club (approved and permitted by Council) in 2016.

c. What changes would you want made?

The Plan should acknowledge the historical presence and current day significance of the Kapiti Underwater Club as a long established stakeholder on Maclean Park and as an objective should be looking to both preserve or incorporate the established and future needs of the club in the planning process.

d. Any other comments (optional)? (then go to Q6)

The Kapiti Underwater Club has no legal relationship with The Kapiti Boating Club, or the Kapiti Coastguard, all of whom appear to have been grouped together as a single stakeholder with whom the Council has had limited consultation. Given the significant investment the Kapiti Underwater Club has made in building infrastructure in 2016, fully permitted and approved by Council, the lack of pro-active consultation with the Kapiti Underwater Club is at odds with the Engagement Process (5.1) where it is slated that there were 14 workshops held with key stakeholder groups. There has been no formal approach made by Council to the Kapiti Underwater Club that may have alerted to the club that the redevelopment of Maclean Park included the area north of the Tikotu Stream. The Draft Plan, including the historical timelines, has major focus on the area south of the Tikotu Stream which suggests that this area was where the majority of consultation and discussion has occurred.







We currently see a fundamental change is required to the Draft Management Plan for the Northern portion of the park.

Paraparaumu Beach Business Association & community, feel that the KCDC consultation process has not meaningfully engaged the key stakeholders affected by any future framework involving the north end of Maclean Park, meaning the boating club and land that is being designated for the Kapiti Gateway.

From the beginning of the consultation process we in the business community have asked the KCDC to designate an area of land south of Tikotu Stream at Paraparaumu Beach, for future consultation to potentially build, a small Visitor / Bio Security centre.

The Paraparaumu Beach Business Association put together a survey (link here https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/VisitorHub) it has received over 340 responses to date.

If you go to the survey you will see the questions are relevant to any development in the park for now and our future growth. We can release the results of this survey if required.

A brief outline below:

50% have visited the island

83% say we need the Visitor/Bio Security Hub within 2 years

81% say we need a small iconic building

83% say they want to see a design for the Hub

Question 10 Is it important to you that we have a Kapiti Island Visitor / Bio Security Hub at Paraparaumu Beach for:

75% Kapiti identity as a tourist destination

78% Protection of our bird life

75% Protection of our Marine Reserve

70% Information about DOC "Wellington-Kapiti Place" entrance to Scenic and recreation reserves

During the consultation process we have requested that the KCDC circle an area on the park for a stage 1 for visitor education / bio security hub. To potentially develop a small iconic building that is brought to fruition with local designers, architects etc. The community would have buy in and hopefully be involved, and of course DOC and KCDC as well with the community.

The KCDC consultation process created discourse & rumour within the community, and so the commodore of the Kapiti Boating Club called a special meeting Saturday (19th August), and it became very clear that KCDC had **not** formally engaged with key stakeholder groups at any point of the consultation process. We find this unsettling given KCDC are on their third stage of consultation. Consultation with our biggest boat operator to Kapiti Island, the Kapiti Explorer, has been non-existent. The KCDC had NOT consulted with the main tenants on the land - the Kapiti Boating Club, the Kapiti Underwater Club, or the Coast Guard.

I engaged with the Department of Conservation – Lou Sanson who referred me onto Reg Kemper (Director Operations Lower North Island) and his response in particular to a few areas was to state the following:

"The Department does not intend to build or manage a visitor centre at this location and holds no budget to do so."

"The Department does not have a fixed view on the best location for this, however in terms of good bio-security practice and in making the process

simple for visitors, being as close to the boat loading point as possible is desirable."

I then had contact with Rob Stone (Partnership Manger), he arranged for me to meet Amy Satterfield (Partnership Ranger) – Amy has been in discussion with KCDC and she informed me of the following:

"DOC do not have a preference as to where the Bio Security Hub is positioned."

"Amy discussed with the Paraparaumu Boating Club the possibility of holding the Bio Security checks from the club however this would have to firstly be agreed with the operators specifically Kapiti Explorer and Kapiti Island Nature Tours and then of course comply with all KCDC planning approvals, etc etc"

Discussing our proposal of a "circle on the page" with Amy and the ideas behind it brought positive feedback from her, and an understanding how this could successfully work.

We have been told on many occasions by KCDC staff and councillors that DOC are insisting that the location for any Bio Security / Education centre must be on the boating club land – from my discussions etc with DOC this is NOT true.

We believe a common-sense staged approach will give weight and an insight to our future needs. This will also safeguard Kapiti Island and create sustainable tourism.

We believe a small iconic building, we can all be proud of, is what we need.

We believe a future plan needs to progress from this small iconic building once we know what works, or doesn't work. The small iconic building can be incorporated into the future plan for the whole Kapiti Gateway Project.

For any plan to succeed you need to have the community on board, but in particular the main stakeholders - the three tenants of the building, the tour operators Kapiti Explorer & Marine Charter, Kapiti Island Nature Tours and of course the Paraparaumu Beach Business community.

The Paraparaumu Beach Business Association, would like to be at the table for any discussion on the development of project Area A "the gateway", and future plans for visitor centre / bio security hub, especially if it is planned to include commercial operation/s (ie café's, shops etc).

The Older persons council (OPC) is committed to working with the Kāpiti Coast District Council and the wider community to ensure that the Kāpiti Coast becomes an age friendly District. It also advises Kāpiti Coast District Council on matters of policy and planning and the impact of these on the community.

We wish to submit the following points regarding the proposed upgrade of Maclean Park, Paraparaumu

- 1. OPC ask that the committee make provision for intergenerational interaction within the park by means of seating and picnic areas, along with recreational areas that all age groups might participate in, such as a petanque or boules area.
- 2. In addition, we recommend the provision of recreational exercise facilities for older people such as landscaped step up facilities, arm lifts and gym rings, rails for stretching and extending steps and other facilities. There is a wealth of information on these available via the internet with pictures and examples included. Most equipment is designed to improve balance and minimize the risk of falls, build muscle strength and tone, extend the range of motion for older people and improve manual dexterity. These functions all assist people to maintain independence in older age.
- 3. We are concerned that The Kiosk be retained. We regard this building as a landmark feature of the park and it should be incorporated into any new design. Perhaps it could be relocated further toward the boating club on the northern side of the park and incorporated into a new proposed visitors center for people visiting Kapiti Island. We understand that as a standalone building it is too small to be useful as a visitor's center, but it could be incorporated into a sympathetic design which enables it to be retained as a feature of the park.
- 4. The Kiosk is also a useful and affordable community venue and has been used by many community organizations for meetings in recent years. It is an asset to the community. Provision of a rainwater collection system and solar power would enhance the use of this facility.

We hope that you will give these matters your due consideration.
