### **COMMUNITY GRANTS SCHEME 2017**

### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

1 This report provides a summary of the 49 applications received for the Community Grants Scheme 2017. The report will assist the Community Grants Allocation Committee to make decisions regarding the allocation of funds.

#### **DELEGATION**

2 The Grants Allocation Committee has delegated authority to consider this matter.

#### BACKGROUND

- 3 The Community Grants Scheme provides funding to eligible not-for-profit organisations and groups to support community based projects, programmes and events which contribute to achieving positive social outcomes for residents of the Kāpiti Coast District.
- 4 The grant is available to organisations or groups who provide a local service that contributes to community wellbeing and development and is responsive to an identified need.

#### The criteria

- The Community Grants Scheme, in its current contestable format, has been available to the community since 1998. The current criteria and conditions still reflect the original outcomes, which are:
  - Building resilient and sustainable communities
  - Encouraging greater community participation
  - Improving the quality of life of the participants
  - Working in partnership with a range of community groups, including iwi
- 6 In 2016, as a result of feedback arising from granting processes, a number of changes were made to the criteria to better reflect the purpose and articulate the expectations of the Scheme. The following changes were made on the recommendation of the previous Grants Allocation Committee;
  - Better defined outcomes that align with the Council's Long Term Plan outcomes
  - Better defined eligibility purposes
  - More clarity added to ineligible items pertaining to capital items and specifications on rent, subscriptions and wages.

- The maximum grant available has increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000 to accommodate current prices and outlays as there had been no change to the maximum since 1998.
- 7 The criteria outlining eligibility and ineligibility are attached at Appendix A of this report.

### **COMMUNITY GRANTS SCHEME 2017**

- 8 Forty nine applications were received this round, with a total amount of \$85,000 requested to support activities that contribute to better social outcomes. Copies of all applications have been sent out to the Grants Allocation Committee and a summary of all applications is at Appendix B. Of these:
  - A total of 42 applications are deemed eligible
  - Seven are deemed ineligible based on the criteria specifications.

### Ineligible Applications

**9** The table below (Table 1) outlines the ineligible applications and includes recommendations for referral to a more appropriate funding scheme where appropriate.

### **ISSUES AND OPTIONS**

### Allocating Funding

- 10 Forty two applications are deemed eligible with a total of \$72,046 requested from a total fund pool of \$33,000. The 2017 Community Grant Scheme is oversubscribed by \$39,000.
- 11 In order to allocate funding in accordance with the criteria (outlined in Appendix A) while not exceeding the total amount of \$33,000, three options are proposed.

# Option 1

- 12 Option 1 involves allocating funds to eligible applications that meet all four conditions outlined in the Appendix A, these are:
  - · Building resilient, sustainable communities
  - Encouraging greater community participation
  - Improving the quality of life of the participants
  - Working in partnership with a range of community groups including iwi.
- 13 This would result in 32 of the 42 eligible applications receiving a share of the total pool of \$33,000; this will mean reducing the requested amount for each by \$730. As a consequence of this any application requesting funding under \$700 will not be funded. Ten applications would receive no funding as they meet 3 or fewer of the outcomes outlined above. This is examined in more detail in Table 2 of this report.
- 14 This is the recommended option. Awarding grants based on all four outcomes criteria would result in 32 applicants receiving a grant, with the view that, all

- grant funding would contribute to initiatives that would have a positive impact on the community within the scope of the Scheme's parameters.
- 15 It is important to note that partially funding applications may also impact on the level of deliverables associated with each initiative.

### Option 2

- 16 Option 2 involves allocating funds to all 42 eligible applications regardless of how many conditions they meet. All applications would receive part funding resulting in a reduction of \$930 per application.
- 17 As a consequence any applications requesting funding for \$1,000 or under would receive no funding. This option is examined in more detail in Table 2.
- 18 This is not the recommended option as grants amount would decrease and result in applicants not receiving enough funds to complete their project or activity outlined in their application.

### Option 3

19 Option 3 involves funding fewer applicants for the full amount requested, not exceeding the total amount available of \$33,000. All eligible applicants would be assessed firstly on whether they meet all four conditions, which would be option 1, and then each of these applications would be assessed individually at the discretion of the Committee based on social significance and value to the community.

# Applying Options 1 and 2 to applications

20 The figure below is a colour key to assist with interpreting Table 2 which shows a comparison of Option 1 and Option 2 with each eligible application along with an overall total of each option.

### Information about the Community Grant Scheme

Kāpiti Coast District Council is pleased to open its Community Grant Scheme for Grants of up to \$2,000 are available to support community based projects, programmes and events which contribute to achieving positive social outcomes for people living on the Kāpiti Coast District - The Kāpiti Coast District boundaries cover Paekākāriki to the South and Ōtaki to the North.

### Who can apply?

Any organisation or group applying for the grant must;

- be not-for-profit;
- provide a local service that contributes to community wellbeing and development;
- be **responsive** to an identified need

#### What are the conditions?

The Community Grant will be designated to the purpose of one or more of the following outcomes:

- 1. Building resilient, sustainable communities
- 2. Encouraging greater community participation
- 3. Improving the quality of life of the participants
- 4. Working in partnership with a range of community groups, including iwi.

#### What can the grant are used for?

Funds can be used for:

- 1. Seeding grants.
- 2. New programmes, projects or events.
- 3. Improvements or enhancements to existing programmes.
- 4. Skill development of programme participants.
- 5. Training needs of workers.
- 6. Publicity or education material directly related to the aim of the programme.
- 7. Equipment which is necessary to achieve the outcomes of the programme, specified in the application.
- 8. Transport services where some disability is involved.
- 9. Transport to events where some disability is involved.
- 10. Administration costs.

#### What can't the grant be used for?

Funds cannot be used for:

A. Purposes that do not directly relate to the social activity/programme or event outlined in the application.

- B. Sports, fitness, leisure and arts activities (where these are covered by other Council funding schemes).
- C. Significant capital expenditure and infrastructure costs (i.e. buildings and facility improvements) that are subject to depreciation.
- D. Ongoing costs where the applicant is not meeting any of the costs.
- E. Rent, subscriptions or wages not directly related to the project, programme or event
- F. Travel, (excluding point 8 and 9 of what the above section)
- G. Debt servicing.
- H. Project or programmes which have already occurred.
- I. Catering and alcohol costs.

It is important to note that applications received after the close date will not be considered.
